





"one lay person and one clergy person from each district." Approved.

Don Pike made the motion "that the report of the Strategic Planning Committee be renamed to the Committee on Research and Planning for the purpose of supervision of implementation and perpetuation of the evergreening process with the understanding the Research and Planning Committee will meet with the Cabinet at least twice annually for the purpose of consultation, coordination and cooperation." Approved.

VI. Reports

COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

The report from the district superintendents has become a tradition and it is anticipated by the Annual Conference. Paragraph 526, Section 4, of the 1976 Discipline, charges the Cabinet "with the oversight of the spiritual and temporal affairs of a conference." This report is significant in that it marks the ending of one quadrennium and the beginning of another. We, in reality, have the privilege of evaluating our past and setting our goals for the future. This is a process that never ends but it takes on new meaning as we meet now

immediately following the General Conference held in Indianapolis, Indiana.

It is appropriate that this report shall begin with a general statement concerning the conference. It was a conference that reflected the mood of our day. We have always had extremes, both to the right and to the left, in the church and in society, but it seemed to be the mood of this General Conference that the United Methodist Church has not the time, the money, nor the inclination to continue to placate the extremes. There seemed to be a mood which said: "Let us get on with our main task and the purpose of our existence." A lot was said about our missional priority for the next four years. The call for evangelism and membership recruitment was heard. Also there was the reminder that the world has hungry people who need to be fed and it is our responsibility to do it.

The Central Texas Conference leadership was very visible in the leadership of the General Conference. Bishop Stowe brought the challenging and inspiring Episcopal Address that set the tone for many things to come. Mr. Pat Stroman, our Conference Lay Leader for the past eight years, coordinated the preparation of and helped present the historic Laity Address. It was historic not only because it was the very first to be presented but because of its content and challenge, Dr. J. B. Holt worked diligently as the very efficient secretary of the General Conference and was elected to another four year term. Dr. Sidney Roberts was elected chairman of the prestigious legislative committee on The Council on Ministries and served well. The remaining delegates were in their places voting conscientiously for or against the issues as they came to the conference floor. You were served well.

We rejoice with you and applaud you for some positive steps during the year 1979. Once again the Central Texas Conference paid all apportioned items in full. This accomplishment can indicate several things. It means a certain amount of pride on the part of all of our churches and people. It is also an endorsement of our connectionalism, stating dramatically that we are not standing as individual congregations but that we are a connectional denomination working together to fulfill the hopes and dreams of our Christ and of our

forefathers and mothers in the faith.

Once again our conference was among the leaders in Methodism in our support of the Ethnic Minority Local Church Missional Priority and of The Cause of World Hunger. We applaud the General Conference in setting one priority for the next quadrennium, that being the Ethnic Minority Local Church and we believe that during the next four years great strides will be taken in this regard. At the present time ethnic minorities comprise twenty-five percent of our nation's population. By the year 2000 it is estimated that this will rise to thirty-five or forty percent. But at the same time only five percent of the membership of the United Methodist Church is of ethnic minorities. We simply cannot fail to take seriously our responsibilities to reach out with the gospel of Christ to this rapidly growing population in our midst.

The fact that we have one priority does not mean that we are to neglect the many

additional needs in our midst. Some additional needs to which we must address ourselves

are evangelism, family life, and hunger.

We also extend our sincere sympathy to all of those families touched by the experience of death whose names have been listed elsewhere in the memorial service.

We must never take the parsonage family for granted and we are always sensitive to the special problems related to the itinerant ministry. In this regard one of the important events of the past year was a seminar titled "Stress in the Parsonage Family" that was well attended by most of the ministers and their spouses.

We appreciate the patience of our parsonage families during the time of transition and improvement in our conference insurance program and we are sorry for the inconvenience of those who have had to wait for unpaid claims. But at the same time we applaud the attitude of our Council on Finance and Administration and the Committee on Clergy Benefits who have been determined that no member of the conference would lose money

because of the default of the insurance company.

We want to stress again our belief in and commitment to the connectional system peculiar to the United Methodist Church. This is not something we can take for granted because there are always forces seeking to weaken and undermine it. We do believe in change and progress but not at the expense of the basic concept of our connectionalism. No single United Methodist Church stands alone and we are grieved when we discover that minister who leaves the impression that he owns his own church and owes nothing to the great heritage that is common to us all. One of the geniuses of our church has been the appointive, itinerant system. But we are aware that there are factors arising that make the appointive process more difficult. Some of these factors of which we should be aware are:

(1) When the spouse of a minister is employed and we must take that employment seriously;

(2) When a minister owns his/her own home and because of it cannot easily move or when the church does not own a parsonage and because of that a minister cannot easily be appointed to that church:

(3) When we espouse a pluralistic theology and discover increasingly that congregations and ministers are theologically incompatible; (4) When we proclaim the ideal and hope of an open itinerancy but are aware that few ministers and congregations are ready for it to become a reality;

(5) When we have an increasing number of clergy couples who must be appointed to the

same charge or nearby parishes.

All of these factors complicate the appointive, itinerant system. We, therefore, ask for patience on the part of congregations and ministers as we proceed diligently in the process

of making appointments.

According to the statistics we made some slight gains in membership during 1979. To be exact, we gained 388 in membership. However, there were slight losses in attendance in both worship and Sunday School. The loss in average Sunday School attendance was only 26 from the year before. This is significant in that it marked a trend in the right direction. The report last year showed a decrease in Sunday School average attendance of 1726 from the year before. Therefore, we observe that something is being done right in the area of Sunday School.

However, with the increasing population in most parts of our conference we confess that we are running far behind in church growth and development. Regardless of the good leadership and great gains by those who have gone before us the fact that we are not growing in numbers and reaching new people constantly stands as our judge. We therefore heartily endorse the creation of a Commission on Church Growth and Development and we urge all of the people to give your best support to it.

We also endorse report number three of the Strategic Planning Committee to this Annual Conference. The implementation of this report will be the agenda for our Annual Conference for at least the next five years. We encourage all of the ministers and congregations to take

it seriously and become involved in all phases wherever it is possible to do so.

Bishop W. McFerrin Stowe has been our able leader for the past eight years. We have come to love and appreciate him and his wife, Twila. It is with sadness that we bid them farewell at this the last session of the Central Texas Annual Conference over which he will preside. But as our thoughts and emotions linger with the past our dreams lead us to accept the challenge of the future.

May 2, 1980

District Superintendents of above named persons asked to inform PPR committees where they are appointed that these persons will be serving their internship this year and the congregation will be asked to be a teaching congregation.

Supervisoring pastors selection will begin as soon as appointments are known.

May 29, 1980

Probationary Interns to meet at Highland Park United Methodist Church in Dallas at 10:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. North Texas Interns will participate also. 10 a.m. - 12 noon will be spent with Craig Emerick, our process person for orientation. 1 - 3 p.m. will be spent with the consultant, Tom Harris, for the first Growth Group meeting. Growth Group dates and meeting places will be decided that day. The Growth Group will meet monthly.

June 24, 25 and 26

Field Instructors Institute at Perkins School of Theology. Supervising Pastors who have not been trained will be asked to attend. The cost will be \$25.00 per day (\$75.00

total) plus room and board. The cost will be borne by the Board of Ministry.

By July 15, 1980 an orientation for the Administrative Board/congregation of each church having a Probationer/Intern will be completed. The orientation will be at the local church and done by a representative of the Board of Ministry Intern Committee, the District Superintendent, and Craig Emerick with the probationer and the supervising pastor present.

By August 1, 1980 the second Growth Group composed of Probationer/Interns and the

consultant will have been held.

By August 31, 1980 all lay committees will have met with the Intern committee representative, District Superintendent, Process Person (Craig Emerick), the probationer and the supervising pastor for training for the lay committee (PPR).

By August 31, 1980 the Supervising Pastors and the consultant will have met for their first session to discuss supervising issues. They will set meeting times and places for a

meeting every other month thereafter.

By November 15, 1980 a Mid-term evaluation and renewal of the Learning Contract will be completed. The first Learning Contract should be completed by September 15, 1980. The Learning Contract will be given to the Lay Committee (PPR), the supervising pastor, the District Superintendent, the Process Person (Craig Emerick), the consultant (Tom Harris), and all members of the Board of Ministry Intern Committee. The Intern, the Supervising Pastor and the lay committee (PPR) will agree on the Learning Contract. A representative of the Conference Intern Committee will approve the Learning Contract and/or make suggested changes to the probationer. The

probationer may appeal the representative's suggested changes to the full Conference Intern Committee if the probationer disagrees with the suggested changes.

By April 1, 1981 the final evaluation and the intern program will be concluded. All the evaluation process and procedures will be under the direction of the Process Person (Craig Emerick).

The Probationer/Intern and the Supervising Pastor will meet every other week for a 1 to 1½ hour supervisory session. The basis of the session will be a verbatim or process note prepared in written form by the probationer prior to the supervisory session.

The Probationer/Intern shall meet with the District Superintendent for a supervisory session once a month. A process note or verbatim written in advance by the probationer and given to the District Superintendent in advance, should be the basis of the session.

The Probationer/Intern and the Supervisory Pastor shall meet with the Lay Committee

(PPR) at least monthly.

The mid time and final evaluation should have the probationer, the supervising pastor, the District Superintendent, the Process Person, the Consultant, one or two members of the lay committee (PPR), and the Board of Ministry Intern Committee representative present.

Report Of The Committee On Director Of Professional Ministries Report No. 1

Approved 6-2-80

The Committee continues to work in a consultative relationship with Dr. Ben Feemster, the Area Director of Professional Ministries, to assist him in meeting the needs of area clergy and their families. We function as a support group to Dr. Feemster through which needs of the area are brought to his attention. An additional function of ours is the evaluation of his ministry.

The Committee is delighted with the first year of this ministry and feels a deep sense of appreciation to Dr. Feemster for the manner in which he carries out his responsibilities.

The Committee To Study The Parsonage System Report No. 1

Tabled 6-2-80

In the 1979 Session of the Central Texas Annual Conference Bishop Stowe appointed a committee of laity and clergy to make a study of the positive and negative aspects of the local church providing parsonages or housing allowances and the effect this may have on the church, the minister, and the appointive, itinerant system. After a study of other annual conferences, input of various conference members, and opinions expressed by the committee members, there were many positive and negative points established with the following as typical examples:

A. PRO: (for the parsonage system and against housing allowance)

1. It provides quick available housing to the minister's family when a move is necessary.

It facilitates the itinerant, appointive system.

2. There are no heavy and unusual financial demands on the pastor when he/she goes to a new assignment. Because of the spiraling cost of housing, the availability of a parsonage prevents unnecessary financial strain on the limited resources of the pastor.

- 3. In many communities the parsonage is available for the minister's family when no other housing is.
 - 4. The parsonage system is less expensive for the church during inflationary times.

 5. The 1976 Discipline assumes church ownership of the parsonage. (Par. 260, 2-(4).)

B. CON: (against the parsonage system and for the allowance)

 There is no investment for the minister toward retirement housing. Ministers and their families are "nudged" by circumstances to provide for their later years when no parsonage is available. The housing allowance helps to provide for this security.

The pastor realizes an actual increase in dollar income since both taxes and interest paid on a mortgage are deductible while the housing allowance used to pay those items is

not counted as income.

- The minister's family has no choice concerning the size or type of house in which they are to live.
- Soon after the death of a minister it is necessary for the family to move and "pull up" roots if they are living in a parsonage.
- Because the minister pays no taxes, he/she does not feel as much a part of the community. There is no pride of ownership if they live in a parsonage.
 C. CONCLUSIONS:

There are advantages and disadvantages to both systems and the diverse opinions and positions must be respected. However, at the same time the Annual Conference, because of its unique system of appointing ministers to churches and expecting there to be no interruption or delay of ministry, must assume a position and maintain a policy. The committee therefore recommends the following:

- 1. Every charge requiring a resident pastor shall own and maintain a furnished parsonage. This parsonage shall be in keeping with the standards set by the 1973 Annual Conference, (page 124, 1973 Journal, Central Texas Conference) and shall always be available for the use of the minister and his/her family. Such churches not now owning a parsonage shall comply with this policy not later than the next change of a senior minister for their church.
- 2. Whether or not the pastor lives in the parsonage or has a housing allowance shall be negotiable. In the consultative process when the appointment is being made, there is the possibility of an interview including the pastor-parish relations committee, the pastor, and the district superintendent. If the pastor desires to have a housing allowance, it shall be made known at this time and all above parties must agree. If agreement is reached and if a housing allowance is permitted, the church owned parsonage may be rented and the allowance paid the minister shall be at least the amount of the fair rental value of the parsonage less any amount necessary to "professionally" store the parsonage furniture. It shall also be understood that the same procedure must be followed at anytime during the tenure of the pastor when a housing allowance is desirable.

3. There must be the understanding that ours is a connectional system and the itineracy of ministers is a vital part of it. Therefore, in no way shall home ownership deter the itinerant, appointive system. Also, home ownership by the minister involves certain risks which the minister and family must understand and accept, such as possible loss on investment,

emotional ties to home ownership, difficulty in buying and selling houses.

4. Since providing a home for retirement is high on the list of priorities, we therefore recommend that every minister begin now making appropriate investments that would make available housing for retirement. This might be done by purchasing rental property, investments with the General Board of Pensions, or other appropriate investments. We feel that if at all possible the minister must not be dependent on someone else to provide retirement housing for him/her. (Of course, there are always exceptions to this rule and we must continue to maintain superannuate parsonages.) We, therefore, further recommend that the Annual Conference provide leadership in training ministers in appropriate investments and money management.

5. Finally, we recommend that the report of the Ad Hoc Committee on Ministerial Remuneration, the section on Housing, beginning on page 124, 1973 Journal, be reprinted in pamphlet form and in the place of paragraph B on page 127 include this report and that the combined reports be made available to all churches within the conference.

1980 - 1981 Goals

GOAL I -

Continue with visibility of COSROW to conference churches through articles and personal contact, encourage women in the pulpit.

Rationale: To educate the local church on the status and role of women and to develop consciousness of women's role and status.

Implementation: COSROW to spotlight -

- women in ministry in Texas Methodist during women-in-the-pulpit month.
- series of articles spotlighting women in our conference beginning in January, 1981 and running one article per month.
- 3. series of articles spotlighting lay and diaconal women in our conference.
- picture display at Annual Conference 1981 of women in ministry (lay, diaconal, clergy) and brochures listing women and accomplishments.

GOAL II -

Continue contact with divorced clergy spouses within our conference and to show our concern for their adjustment to a new role and life.

Rationale: Because of the increase of divorces among the clergy and the problems of adjustment by the divorced persons to a new life style, the Commission feels there is a need for continuing support.

Implementation: An ongoing project, January - December, 1981.

GOAL III -

COSROW will coordinate with the Director of Professional Ministries in order to -

- prepare printed resource materials regarding insurance, pension, area counseling and other benefits.
- encourage the Director of Professional Ministries to meet with each district ministers' and spouses' group in order to disseminate and explain the above information.

Rationale: Because all clergy spouses have not been apprised of the above information, COSROW establishes this goal.

Implementation: January 1981 — Representative of COSROW will meet with Director of Professional Ministries to set timeline to implement above goal.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN Report No. 1

Accepted 6-2-80

This year, 1980, marks the centennial for United Methodist Women in Central Texas Conference. It was in November, 1880, that the Rev. Ransome organized a women's missionary group in Waco. In these ten decades, thousands of women have engaged in home and foreign missionary work through fundraising, prayer, and study of world conditions as they affect women and children. They were quick to see sharp contrasts between the reconciliation and justice espoused in the Bible and the realities within cultures of their day. Binding up the wounds of oppression seemed endless, so they began to address more directly the underlying causes. Their voices were raised against the abuse of alcohol and tobacco, child labor, hazardous working conditions, and slavery, both here and abroad. They condemned as demeaning and degrading customs of foreign countries which allowed child brides, harems, footbinding, and concubines sold to the highest bidder. Here at home they advocated women's suffrage, child custody laws, the right to own and manage one's own property, and laity and ordination rights in the church. Who can measure the contributions of these visionaries who turned aside the jibes of detractors? We only know that we cannot forget those who pioneered for us.

While districts and local units are planning their own historical research and celebrations, the conference holds its centennial meeting on October 4, at Austin Avenue in Waco. It seemed fitting to return to the city of our origin and to the church which, in the past, has hosted many historical meetings of women organized for mission. It was there in 1940 that we became the Women's Society of Christian Service and where, in 1973, we became United Methodist Women. It will be a time for remembering those who are former officers, missionaries and deaconnesses; for recognizing the women holding the longest record of membership; for celebrating families where several generations of women are presently members of United Methodist Women.

Ms. Thelma Stevens, who chaired the Section of Christian Social Relations in the Women's Division for many years, will be our speaker. She recently authored a book documenting our social involvement as women in the church. Her understanding of that legacy gives her a unique advantage in suggesting what our future holds. We invite you to hear this outstanding woman.

The dates for the 1980 Schools of Christian Mission are: July 23-25 for the weekday school and July 26-27 for the weekend school. Both schools are to be held here at TWC. You will find posters for your bulletin boards, registration forms, and information about child care in your recent coordinated mailing or in the display area here at the conference. Every local church is urged to send representatives who have interest or responsibility in the area of mission. These schools are now the only intensive training in mission currently available in this conference. We commend the Committee on Advance and Education as reported on

p. 25 of the Pending Reports in their intent to provide another mission event. Mission education is not an exclusively women's issue, but should reach a broader spectrum of the

church, especially children.

United Methodist Women identify with the five priorities which this conference has named in the report of the Strategic Planning Committee. Leadership development, membership concerns, spiritual enrichment through private and corporate worship, stewardship, and the whys and hows of mission could well summarize our own agenda. Both we and the Annual Conference are strengthened when we work toward common goals.

Several actions of the recent General Conference serve to recognize the contributions

which United Methodist Women make to the life of the church:

1. By adopting the same Charter on Racial Justice Policies which United Methodist Women in all 73 conferences adopted, the whole church is allied in the effort to eliminate racial discrimination. We affirm the goals on inclusiveness which this particular annual conference has set forth and pledge our efforts to see them accomplished.

By reaffirming the mandate for a local unit of United Methodist Women in every local church, the General Conference recognized the prophetic presence of the organization of women in mission and also recognized those women as the chief source of mission funds for

the entire church.

3. Having been inspired and uplifted by our own research into the history of Central Texas Conference, we are pleased to note that the General Conference has initiated a history detailing the work of women in the United Methodist Church. The church, as the family of God, needs to know its genealogy. For too long historians have failed to record the contributions women have made to church and society.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE Report No. 1

Approved 6-3-80

After many hours of prayerful thinking and deliberations, the Commission on Religion and Race has devised a method of monitoring, consulting and examining ethnic minority representation, participation and programming on all the conference boards, agencies, commissions and committees, as well as the governing boards of related institutions. Commission members will be attending meetings of all the conference boards, agencies, commissions and committees to monitor their goals, proposals, purposes, objectives, and programs, to deal with the pressing issue of racism, minority group empowerment, attitudinal behavioral, and reconciliation between the races, as we move toward an inclusive conference and church.

The Harry Hoosier Extravaganza was held during the month of September at St. James United Methodist Church, Waco. This program had an emphasis on leadership development, stewardship, evangelism, education and preaching. This program while

being conference-wide, was a celebration of Black ethnic diversity and heritage.

The second annual Religion and Race Consultation Workshop was held at Glen Lake Camp in December with Ms. Evelyn Fitzgerald, General Associate Executive Director, serving as the resource person. The purpose of the workshop was:

- (1) to assist district and local work area Religion and Race chairpersons understand and accept the concept of pluralism and work toward inclusiveness in all areas of the church life:
- (2) to encourage multi-racial dialogue at every level in the church through pulpit exchange, through worship services, fellowships, and study so as to encourage a better understanding of ethnic diversity and heritage in local churches; and

(3) to develop an awareness of and sensitivity to the special concerns of ethnic minority groups.

The Commission on Religion and Race presented a "Celebration of Wholeness — Roots and Branches" in May, with emphasis on the meaning of a racial and ethnic pluralistic United Methodist Church.

Representatives attended the Congress on Evangelism in Tulsa, Oklahoma; Partners in Ecumenism in Dallas; Black Methodists for Church Renewals in Atlanta, Georgia.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1981

 Each local church elect chairpersons on Religion and Race at the Charge Conference and the chairperson attend the Annual Conference or the District Commission on Religion and Race Workshop.

2. Each district(s) schedule a workshop on Religion and Race in consultation with the District Secretary of Religion and Race and the Conference Commission on Religion and Race to deal with the pressing issue of open itinerancy, racism, minority group

empowerment and reconciliation between the races.

3. The Board of Discipleship initiate necessary research and funding in 1982 of the Annual Harry Hoosier Extravaganza, as a program with emphasis on leadership development, stewardship, evangelism, education, information and the development of awareness and sensitivity on the role of ethnic minority persons, lay and clergy, in the leadership and decision-making places in the conference and church.

4. ACCOM continue progress in the elimination of discrimination and racism within its organizational structures and institutions, by providing adequate representation on all

boards and agencies.

Development of multi-ethnic staffs in changing neighborhoods to better meet the needs of the persons in those neighborhoods.

Each district be sensitive to the shifting centers of black population and effect congregational development to the needs for emerging minority neighborhood churches.

ACCOM develop a program aimed at bringing about regular inter-ethnic conversation and other exchanges to facilitate the building of bridges of trust.

8. Cabinet and program staff develop programs designed to prepare both congregations and pastors for cross-racial appointments.

9. Bishop send a "pastoral letter" to each congregation and pastor affirming his/her commitment to cross-racial appointments as a part of the regular appointment process.

10. Cabinet go on record stating that its appointments will be made in the context of an

open itinerancy.

- 11. Annual Conference Board of Ordained Ministry discuss with each candidate the meaning of open itinerancy in the United Methodist Church and the Central Texas Annual Conference.
- 12. Each district superintendent explain the meaning and desirability of an open itinerancy to each Charge Conference, citing biblical and theological authority as well as the position of the United Methodist Church, encouraging questions, responses and open discussions.
- 13. Annual Conference develop ongoing recruitment programs for ethnic minority pastors, not only to meet present or particular "supply" crises, but to challenge faithful Christians to consider the call of the ministry on a continuing basis. To visit theological schools and recruit minority pastors for our conference.

14. CCYM review its projects, discover ethnic youth needs, and evaluate and discover

what programs to sponsor in order to meet the needs of ethnic conference youth.

- 15. District secretaries of Religion and Race will monitor the progress of the local church and serve as a liaison between the local church and the Conference Commission on Religion and Race.
 - 16. Celebration of Wholeness be continued as an annual event.
- 17. All conference boards, agencies, commissions and committees will be visited by Commission on Religion and Race members to monitor their goals, proposals, purposes,

objectives and programs to face the issue of open itinerancy and move in the direction of commitment to ethnic inclusiveness.

- 18. Local congregations examine their feelings and attitudes about persons of different races and cultures.
- 19. Local congregations plan for joint worship services, fellowship dinners, discussion and study groups and services and community projects with congregations of another ethnic or racial background.

ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCH MISSIONAL PRIORITY TASK FORCE Report No. 1

Adopted 6-3-80

The work of the Ethnic Minority Local Church Missional Priority Taskforce has been to raise concerns with boards and committees of the conference relating to ethnic minority persons and congregations. Concerns included:

that the celebration of Heritage Sunday be centered in the ethnic diversity of our heritage

and that an offering for the Advance Special be taken:

that the delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences hold the inclusion of ethnic minority persons and churches as a priority in their decision making;

that the Cabinet's statement on INCLUSIVENESS be implemented;

that all committees on nomination be intentional in seeking out ethnic minority leadership and move beyond token representation;

and that the Conference continue to work for truly equitable salaries.

The taskforce recommends the following goals be continued:

- Ethnic Minority persons, lay and clergy in leadership roles and decision making places in the conference.
- Emphasis on the diaconal ministry for ethnic minority churches.

Action on behalf of inclusiveness in all areas of the church.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO ANNUAL CONFERENCE FROM ANNUAL CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Accepted 6-3-80

1.It is recommended that each local church become a supporting congregation of our mission families. This can be accomplished by either a gift of \$1,000.00 or \$3.00 per member for the smaller churches. A supporting church receives a visit from the missionary when on furlough.

2. That the investiture of the new Bishop for the Dallas-Fort Worth area be held in Fort Worth on September 21, 1980. This would begin the precedent that the investiture would be rotated between the North Texas and Central Texas Conferences upon assignment of a new

episcopal leader.

3. To carry out the recommendation of the Texas Methodist Planning Commission that \$20,000 be set aside in the Reserve Funds of the conference to be utilized when necessary to combat pari-mutuel betting.

4. That the office of ACCOM expand its co-ordinated mailing so both the pastor and

chairperson of the local church Council on Ministries receive a copy of each mailing.

5. That each District Coordinator of Communications become a voting member of the District Council on Ministries.

That the Board of Higher Education and Ministry be changed to the Commission on Higher Education and Campus Ministry. This will give flexibility to the membership so a workable, interested group might be organized.

The various Boards, Commissions and Committees of ACCOM are ready to assist and implement any recommendations of the Strategic Planning Committee which are adopted

by the Annual Conference.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY Report No. 1

Adopted 6-3-80

The Board has the goal of conducting in the fall of 1980, a "Convocation on Ministries with the Family." This would be a one-day activity making available personnel and resources readily accessible in our area to help families cope with situations in the last part of the 20th century.

A second goal is the beginning of outreach ministries to those in the Central Texas Conference who speak only Spanish. Texas Wesleyan College has offered to begin this summer offering a crash course in conversational Spanish for pastors and laity. The cost would include only the costs of texts and materials and instructors. Texas Wesleyan College will provide the housing for the several-week course. Participants would live on campus and speak only Spanish. During the winter participants would be required to return to the campus for instruction twice a month. If this model proves successful, we hope to approach Southwestern University asking for the same type of instruction.

A third goal is the display at the 1980 Annual Conference of all the publications available

from the General Board of Church and Society.

1981

The Board of Church and Society of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church recognizes and affirms the full humanity and personhood of all individuals as members of the family of God. We affirm the responsibility of the church of Jesus Christ to minister in His spirit. Thus, as a major thrust of the ministry of our Lord was directed to persons with mental, physical, and/or psychologically handicapping conditions, we affirm the gospel imperative that we be in ministry with all persons, including those persons with mental, physical and/or psychologically handicapping conditions whose disabilities or differences in appearance or behavior create a problem in mobility, communication, intellectual comprehension, or personal relationships which interfere with their participation or that of their families in the life of church and the community. We urge the church to receive the gifts of persons with handicapping conditions to enable them to be full participants in the community of faith.

Therefore, we call upon each local church in the Central Texas Annual Conference to:

Insure the accessibility of their facilities to persons with handicapping conditions by the installment of ramps, handrails and other such enabling devices as may be needed; and

2) By undertaking in each local church a study of needs and opportunities for ministries with persons with handicapping conditions in the local community, with the results of said study to be reported to the local church charge conference for 1981; and

3) By assuming an advocary role in the local community for programs of rehabilitative services, employment, education, housing, adequate transportation and other related concerns for persons with handicapping conditions.

GOALS FOR 1981

It is the goal of the Board of Church and Society to enable and enhance ministries of the local churches to those in our area who speak only the Spanish language. Texas Wesleyan College is offering a course in conversational Spanish, specifically for the laity and clergy of the Central Texas Conference in the summer of 1981 on its campus in Fort Worth. To encourage participation by the laity, the Board is offering scholarships for the 1981 session.

So that ministries to families can be strengthened in the future, the Board will sponsor the training of teachers in the following areas: family clustering techniques, TV awareness and ministries to mentally retarded. Two seminars on family ministries will be offered in 1981.

The Board is continuing to explore ways to be in ministry to those serving in penal

institutions and to their families.

Every local church is urged to become progressively more sensitive to social issues within their own community and around the world and to address these issues in the light of

the gospel of Jesus Christ. Councils on Ministries, Administrative Boards and individual members are encouraged to urge their pastors to address from the pulpit and in newsletters those issues on the domestic and international front which seem to be causing drastic changes in our living patterns. The world expects the church of Jesus Christ to address these issues. There are no assumptions that all Christians have to agree on these problems and their solutions, but there is the belief that it is a betrayal of Christ for the church not to confront the bloody face of history with the Good News that Christ died to save sinners. Dealing with these issues in local churches might also provide the catalyst for expressions from the local churches and individual members to the General Boards and Agencies of the church and thereby enhance communication up and down the hierarchical ladder.

Adopted 6-3-80

Committee On Education In The Local Church And Leadership Development 1981 Goals And Rationale

1. By May, 1981, sponsor Camp Dean-Director training.

Rationale: The Committee has sponsored the Camp Dean-Director training for summer camp leaders and will continue the program in 1981 in order to insure that such persons understand their roles, what resources are available and how to recruit and train volunteer camp counselors.

2. Continue to develop and implement camping programs for families, single adults, older adults, elementary youth, and trip camps, as well as provide program subsidy for district

Rationale: The Committee has the responsibility of planning and implementing conference-wide camping experiences for all age levels. We will continue to provide program subsidy for the district camps.

3. By February 1, 1981, have available summer curricula for elementary, junior and

senior high camping events.

Rationale: The Committee will continue to provide cyclical curriculum for elementary, junior and senior high summer camp programs. This task involves securing and paying writers and publishing the curricula for distribution.

4. By January 1, 1981, complete the planning and scheduling of conference-wide training events for teachers of children, youth, and adults, and workers and administrators in the

Church School.

Rationale: The Committee believes that effective training for teachers, workers and administrators in the Church School program is essential. The plan developed by the Strategic Planning Committee calls for such training to occur beginning in 1981.

5. By February 1, 1981, make recommendations to the Board of Discipleship regarding monetary resources to be included in the Board's budget for the purpose of training persons

willing to work on conference and district levels.

Rationale: This Committee will make these recommendations in keeping with the

guidelines of the plan outlined by the Strategic Planning Committee.

6. By March 1, 1981, complete the compiling of a list of persons who are qualified to provide teaching in every age-level who are available to teach in district and/or local church training events.

Rationale: This Committee will compile such a list in keeping with the guidelines of the

plan outlined by the Strategic Planning Committee.

7. By May 1, 1981, provide each district and local church with a listing of all qualified instructors and printed resource materials.

Rationale: The plan of the Strategic Planning Committee calls for the publishing of a list of qualified resource persons who are available to teach on the district and local church levels. The list is to be distributed to each district and all local churches in the conference.

8. By January 1, 1981, publish and distribute to all local churches in the conference the church school evaluation tool entitled "A Discussion and Planning Guide for Improving Your Sunday School Class."

Rationale: The Strategic Planning Committee has prepared an evaluation guide for local church use. The guide is to be used in each class of all local churches with the purpose of increasing interest, participation, and tithes and offerings. The Committee has the responsibility of publishing and distributing this evaluation tool.

9. By December 1, 1981, complete a comprehensive list of church school resources and qualified instructors in every age level and conduct a workshop in each district for the purpose of providing the respective districts and their local churches with training in the

areas of curriculum, resources and available teaching expertise.

Rationale: The plan of the Strategic Planning Committee calls for works

Rationale: The plan of the Strategic Planning Committee calls for workshops to be held in each district to train teachers and others connected with the church school program on the local church level. This Committee has the responsibility of enabling the districts to plan and execute such workshops.

Rev. H. F. Meier and Rev. Don Scott attended the Evangelism Conference in Tulsa,

Oklahoma in January 1980.

Stewardship and Worship Programs Completed in 1979: Goals were deferred for determination and recommendations of the Strategic Planning Committee.

1980 Program

The 1980 program will be implementation of Phase I of "Membership Recruitment/Reactivate the Inactive Member."

Tentative meeting dates for 1980: July 12, 1980; November 8, 1980. Budget expense - none.

Tentative meeting dates for 1981: January 10; September and November. Budget expense: Administrative, supplies and travel — \$1,000.00.

1981 Goals

Goals for 1981:

1. Develop a master plan as a result of site assessment.

Produce and distribute a variety of promotional tools for the Conference camping program.

3. Increase ethnic minority participation in the Conference camping program by recommending development and recruitment of ethnic minority leadership (voluntary and summer staff) within the Conference camping program.

TASK FORCE ON HUMAN SEXUALITY

Goals for 1981:

 To continue training and certification of leaders. This includes certifying three junior high leaders, three senior high leaders, and three elementary leaders. There shall be at least one from each district certified. To schedule a minimum of four junior high and two senior high and two elementary courses during the year.

3. To continue to help facilitate small churches or clusters of churches in planning and

having human sexuality courses for youth and their parents.

4. To continue institutional membership in the American Association of Sex Educators,

Counselors and Therapists.

- 5. To work to lower anxiety within the Conference concerning courses in human sexuality through presentations to district pastors' meetings and district Council on Ministries events.
- To introduce program of the task force to new probationary members by the end of the summer of their joining the Conference.

7. To develop a human sexuality course for married adults.

8. To study administrative relationship possibilities with the Conference office. Rationale:

 To feel that we are beginning to accomplish our task, the Conference needs certified leaders who are qualified and available for carrying out this act of ministry. We are also in need of certified leaders being better distributed throughout all the Conference.

The key to accomplishing our task is to increase participation through the weekend events. With an increased number of certified leaders, we should be able to increase the

number of courses and better serve all the districts.

3. It is important to fulfill the needs of the members of our small churches. Since it is necessary to have a large group of youth in order to financially be able to have a course, we hope to have scholarship money available for the smaller churches.

4. Because of the need for knowledge of new resources in the area of human sexuality, for current training and educational methods, and the necessity to stay current with other sex

educators, we feel this membership is necessary for our task force.

We feel that because of adverse publicity in the media and other factors, we need to analyze why there might be resistance to courses in human sexuality and address these feelings.

6. By introducing this program to new members of the Conference, the ministers of the Conference will realize personally what is available to them and to their future churches in

this area of human need and understanding.

7. The General Board of Discipleship has developed a course for married adults and we

recognize the need to develop this ministry for our Conference.

8. Some of the most successful programs in United Methodism are successful in sex education and have proper credibility because of their close ties to the conference offices involved. We feel a need to examine what is being done in other conferences, see how it has affected the implementation of this ministry, and make recommendations to the Board of Discipleship.

Conference Council On Youth Ministries 1981 Goals

1. There will be a new event for youth focusing on the spiritual life of individuals (i.e., prayer, devotional times and aids).

2. Youth Service Fund will show a 30% conference-wide increase over the giving of 1980.

 Meetings for the Council and for committees will be held in a central location (i.e., Glen Lake). Committees will be organized on a geographical basis.

4. The Council will provide input to the Camps and Assemblies Committee regarding needs for recreational and other facility improvements at Glen Lake. The Council will participate with time and money in work days at the camp.

The Council will work to increase ethnic minority participation at CCYM-sponsored events and will support through publicity other events sponsored for ethnic minority youth.

6. The Council will continue to study the need for a full-time conference youth coordinator,

Methods to improve publicity and communication among members of the Council and youth groups will be implemented.

BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND MINISTRY Report No. 1

Committee On Higher Education

Approved 6-3-80

1981 Goals

1. To give continued support to our Black United Methodist Colleges. We plan to provide

each local church with special emphasis on Wiley and Huston-Tillotson.

Rationale and Timeline: Will continue to let our Conference know about Black Colleges, to continue support financially of the Black Colleges. We want information to be in the hands of each local church by Annual Conference 1981. Committee members will contact the colleges for information and get that information to the conference office. Committee on Higher Education will be responsible for evaluation.

2. To encourage all churches of the Conference to make "College Bound" brochure available to all high school juniors and seniors, and to find other ways to do a better job of

interpreting United Methodist Colleges and Universities of the church.

Rationale and Timeline: To obtain from local churches lists of junior and seniors to send to Texas Methodist Colleges. We want all pastors to put the brochure into the hands of all juniors and seniors by March, 1981. We need to encourage more of our youth to attend Methodist colleges. Names of juniors and seniors should be into the colleges by March 1, 1981. The assignment for leadership will be made within the committee; evaluation of percentage will be done by the committee.

3. To continue to act as liaison between the local church and institutions of higher

education.

Rationale and Timeline: Our college campuses and educational opportunities must be open to all laity of the church for continuing education and for participation with the universities. This information will be distributed to the churches in the conference and completed by December, 1981. The Committee will take the leadership to see this done and evaluation will be made by the Committee.

4. To encourage gifts to the United Methodist Scholarship and Loan Funds.

Rationale and Timeline: The fund for scholarships and loans has been decreasing. To give all young people the opportunity to know this fund is available. The laity of the church need to know that the program needs its support to be effective. The article/flyer will be distributed by June 1, 1981. Information on this program needs to be in the hands of our juniors and seniors by March, 1981.

5. To enhance Student Recognition Day.

Rationale and Timeline: Through Recognition Day, we want the laity to see the need for continued financial support of our universities and colleges. Student Recognition Day is December 1981. Materials need to be distributed to local churches by June, 1981. The Committee will appoint a committee to be responsible and evaluation will be done by the committee.

6. To continue ways to relate to those chaplains within the bounds of our Conference, and those who are members of our Conference but serve elsewhere. We will continue contact through local churches and/or Sunday school classes, through personal letters, newsletters and conference news.

Rationale and Timeline: We must continue to let the chaplains know that they are an important part of the Conference. In 1981, we will appoint a member of the Committee to assume responsibility for coordinating chaplain contact programs. The Committee will evaluate the programs.

To encourage support of the Diaconal Ministry. Make educational and professional opportunities known to students relating to Diaconal Ministry. Help pastors become aware

of the possibilities of the Diaconal Ministry for their youth.

Rationale and Timeline: We must encourage the youth to think about a place in the Diaconal Ministry. By the end of 1981, we would like to see information available in every church to the youth on the Diaconal Ministry. The Committee will be responsible for coordinating work and they will evaluate the work done.

Committee on Campus Ministry

1981 Goals

1. To establish standards for campus ministry in consultation with our campus ministers and the Texas Commission on Campus Ministry (TCCM).

Rationale: There is a dual need for effective communication between campus ministers within the Central Texas Conference as well as campus ministries across the state.

2. To monitor and evaluate present campus ministries in Central Texas Conference.

Rationale: In an effort to assist campus ministers in evaluating their work and to inform the CMC better, a form will be distributed to the campus ministers and submitted to the Committee.

3. To set priorities and strategy for location and initiation of new campus ministries.

Rationale: Campus ministry in the Central Texas Conference cannot remain stagnant. The Committee must address the issue of appropriate expansion considering the financial constraints that exist within the Conference and the educational constraints operating in different academic settings (such as urban community colleges).

4. To review local campus ministry budgets, recommending apportionment request to CF&A; to determine local campus ministry budget in keeping with such allocation of CTC

funds.

Rationale: To provide thoughtful and appropriate budget allocations to support properly

campus ministry in the CTC.

5. To interpret and support campus ministries in the CTC, the Task Force on Goals for Growth in Campus Ministry will be continued with the following twofold purpose: Interpretive — What is Campus Ministry? Increase student awareness of United Methodist Campus Ministry.

Rationale: The CMC must provide the leadership within the Conference in the

implementation of this goal.

6. To express appreciation to local churches for their financial undergirding of campus ministry within the Central Texas Conference.

Rationale: Committee's desire to express this appreciation in written form.

7. To accomplish the above goals, the Committee requests an apportionment of 93¢ per member and figured from the total conference membership and apportioned to the districts on the decimal.

Rationale: In order to maintain campus ministry at a viable level within the Conference, the Committee determines that an apportionment of \$113,000 will be required which computes to approximately 93¢ per member. This figure considers a 7% inflation figure and a 3% growth figure. Budgets for at least the past two years have only reflected inflationary increases with much "belt tightening" at the five campus ministries of the Conference.

COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY Report No. 2 Proposed Structure

Accepted 6-3-80

The new Commission would be directly responsible to the Annual Conference. The Commission will consist of ten members

(1) Selected on basis of interest and willingness to work

(2) One-half clergy and one-half lay members

(3) Officers: chairperson, vice chairperson and secretary and chairpersons for two

committees: Higher Education and Campus Ministry

(4) A resource and support group will consist of one youth and one adult from each campus unit with representation from both campus ministers and board members.

A term of service should begin with some present members who choose to serve with a rotate-off system to coincide with the quadrennium, with some serving two and some four years in first period.

WORSHIP AND SPIRITUAL ENRICHMENT Report No. 3

Accepted 6-3-80

Worship is central in the life of a Christian congregation.

Dr. Paul Hoon in his book, the Integrity of Worship writes, "The core of worship is God acting to give his life to man and to bring man to partake of that life. Hence all we do as

individuals or as the church is affected by worship."

The task of our committee was to uncover the feelings of the United Methodist members in the Central Texas Conference about worship and how it affected their spiritual health and influenced their life's experience. Then, develop a philosophy of worship to aid and assist churches seeking to grow in the area of improving their worship.

One hundred persons participated in the survey. Sixty-one indicated they were laity; thirty, clergy; and nine gave no indication. Of the one hundred surveys, forty-three persons were from age 35-60, eighteen were under age 35 and twenty-four were sixty years or older. There were forty-six males and forty-one females who made a sex identification. Of the one hundred who replied, ninety indicated they attended services every week; and five, twice a

Thirty-four who responded were from churches between fifty and two hundred. Thirtyfour were in churches from two hundred - eight hundred; ten, under fifty; and twenty-one,

eight hundred - two thousand.

In a question concerning preparation for worship, four responses were most prevalent. (1) Prayer (2) Study the scripture lesson for the week (3) Daily sermon reading and/or preparation (4) Bible Study. This indicates a strong attitude toward preparation as a means of participating in worship. Preparation on the part of the minister/worship leader and preparation on the part of the worshipper.

This also means that in order for that preparation to take place, more emphasis needs to take place to inform the worshippers ahead of time as to the scripture, sermon ideas, etc.

through church paper or newsletter.

A second question asked why persons attended Sunday morning worship. Three answers were repeated frequently: to worship my Lord and Savior, for Christian fellowship and

professional responsibility. These three reasons need individual comment.

The first response seems to say that worship meets an important personal need in their religious life. This is not to be taken lightly. The expression of our commitment to Jesus Christ through worship is certainly a vital ingredient for the spiritual health of any church member. There are other ingredients that need to be weighed to measure the effectiveness of that commitment for a healthy understanding of its meaning.

Christian fellowship is a necessary ingredient in worship. To worship as the family of God involves fellowship. This also implies that interaction in worship or relational acts of

worship that involve people is meaningful.

To attend Christian worship simply because of professional responsibilities is a sad commentary but may be a real one. This may be a part of the problem with worship as a spiritual experience in our Conference. Certainly a minister who felt only a professional responsibility to provide adequate worship might well be wishing he/she were not having to tackle that responsibility.

Attitude in the participation of either leading or being involved in worship is a crucial

matter.

The question concerning responsibility in worship got four prevalent responses. (1) the leader-preacher, (2) response to reading of scripture (3) presence and (4) singing (both in

the choir and as a congregation).

The focus on the leader-preacher and response to scripture is reflective of Southwestern mainline protestant tradition with a strong emphasis on scripture and preaching. However, presence and singing does underline an important element in worship — the opportunity for the congregation to participate. Just as in preparation, the participation of the congregation in the worship event differentiates worship from being either a production by minister(s) and choir or little more than a religious devotion tolerated. Worship at its best is a celebration of a congregation's "worth" as people of God. This is an event of participation.

What motivates you in worship and how does Sunday morning worship affect your daily activities? The three primary responses were (1) music, (2) the sermon and (3) sets pace for week. Here again we see the strong pulpit influence and the desire for music in worship. The third response tells us that many persons do use worship as a springboard to encounter

life that week.

In evaluating their corporate worship, the majority of people surveyed saw their worship as traditional and informal and liked it that way. People preferred a form of worship that is traditional, and ritualistic even though informal, and this becomes a constant in persons' lives. All about them may be falling apart, or changing rapidly, but worship is a constant that they can depend on each Sunday. A rock to cling to!

Ninety-five percent of those surveyed saw worship as a teaching-learning experience. Special mention was made of using the creeds for providing more historical information about the church. It was also made mention that sermons may occasionally be used to educate. All surveys said it would make a difference if worship were eliminated. The

reasons given were: the need for fellowship and "it would leave a terrible void."

After examining the survey, it appears the people in the Central Texas Conference are cautious about much change in worship at one time. Our committee recommends more Bible study, exegesis and theologizing in the local church for the purpose of developing a foundation for creative and meaningful change in worship. Such a process would enable the local church to understand and experience themselves as creators and participants in the tradition rather than simply receivers and imitators of it.

The above process represents mutual growth between clergy and laity and provides a significant foundation that will facilitate the implementation of the Annual Conference long range plan in the area of worship and preaching — thereby keeping us open to the advantages of the connectional church. Persons will then have the knowledge and skills to

use the events planned as tools for improved worship at the local level.

Christians are charged to spread the gospel — to evangelize. Living in an age of revolutionary technology in the Communications Field makes available a variety of tools and facets to share the message of the Church.

The Committee on Communications and Interpretation is subject to the direction of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries with the task of improving effective communications. The responsibilities being:

1. Interpretation of benevolence programs (World Service).

- 2. Provide publicity for work and programs in Central Texas Conference.
- 3. Oversight of Conference page of Texas Methodist.
- 4. Encourage use of Conference Resource Library.

Establish stronger links between Local Churches and the Conference.

Concerns:

1. Involve all District Coordinators of Communications.

- 2. Compile Communications Handbook to assist Local Pastor and Local Church Coordinators of Communications.
 - 3. Increase knowledge of the technology and potential of Cable TV.
 - 4. Encourage consideration of more Radio placement.

5. Improve Local Church newsletters.

Evaluation of Action of Committee:

- Representatives of this committee attended the Newsletter Seminar at S.M.U. in September 1979.
- 2. Representatives attended "Grass Roots Media" Seminar in Oklahoma City in November 1979.
- 3. Central Texas Conference Communications Committee joined North Texas Conference in sponsoring a Cable TV Workshop February 19, 1980.

4. Sub-committee preparing Communications Handbook.

- 5. This committee recommended to ACCOM that all Districts include a Communications Workshop in the District Training Event with the initial concentration on Newsletters.
- 6. Recommended to ACCOM that the District Coordinator of Communication become a voting member of the District Council on Ministries.

7. Developed job description for news editor of Texas Methodist.

8. Division of Committee into four categories to focus on: a) Conference Page of Texas Methodist; b) Interpretation of World Service; c) Resource Library; d) Using Public Media.

The Conference Page of the Texas Methodist is extremely significant in communicating the work and programs of the church and this committee re-affirmed the purpose of this

page as follows:

"Based on the belief that the church has a story to tell, this newspaper is published to report the mission and work of the people called United Methodists in Central Texas. The work of the church is important whether being done in conference, district or local level. The job of this newspaper is to report the story of the work wherever that work is being done."

Due to the importance of the Texas Methodist, we encourage local churches to provide it for local officials. The current cost is \$3.75 a subscription with more than 6,000 Conference editions distributed. In addition, local church subscriptions of Texas Methodist in the Central Texas Conference total 12,201 making an approximate total of 18,000.

Church Resource Systems continue to grow and expand under the capable guidance of Dr. Robert Robertson, Director. Beginning its tenth year operating out of Dallas by the Media Division of the United Methodist Communications Council, C.R.S. is owned by seven annual

conferences of Texas and New Mexico. Dr. Robertson also is Director of United Methodist News Service and has organized a top notch news team for Texas and New Mexico to handle Radio, TV and Newspaper coverage at the General Conference in Indianapolis, April 1980.

The obvious key to Church growth in the future is focused on Communications. Utilizing the tools of audio, video, printed word, and the Resource Library we must make this a two-way system — listening and speaking.

Proclaiming and sharing the faith as people of God is our ultimate goal.

COMMITTEE ON RESEARCH AND PLANNING

Report To ACCOM

Accepted 6-3-80

The Committee on Research and Planning has determined five areas of concern within the Annual Conference that indicate a need for study and action.

- 1) There is a need for a greater appreciation for and use of United Methodist curriculum. This need is a reflection that the distinctive theology and polity of the United Methodist Church is not receiving sufficient attention in pulpit and church school classrooms in our conference.
- There is a need for leadership development training for small churches with a particular focus on stewardship and evangelism.
- In view of current economic trends, we should explore ways for viable congregations to exist without traditional facilities.
- 4) The realities of urban and rural pastorates should be studied to determine if the system of appointments could be modified to better respond to these realities.
- 5) There needs to be an increased emphasis in the EMLC in our conference with a particular view of strengthening our relationship with the Rio Grande Conference.

The Committee recommends to the ACCOM that:

- Beginning in 1980, each minister shall report to the Charge Conference their plans for a study on either United Methodist theology or polity for the next year. Following the completion of these plans, an evaluation would be submitted to the district superintendent.
- a. A Special task force be appointed to study the need for changes in tenure for boards and committees leadership, and such structural changes as may be required by General Conference Askings.
- b. the need for changes in the numerical composition of the boards and committees,
 and
- c. the potential for allowing district superintendents to devote more time to small church development.

Committee On Advance and Education Review Of 1980 Goals

1. To promote Advance Special Giving for: a) Missional Priorities b) General Advance

Specials c) Conference Advance Specials.

(Continued support for the above through the District Missionary Secretaries, Conference Coordinated Mailings and special emphasis as outlined by the Conference Board of Global Ministries.)

2. To receive applications for and make allocations of General Conference Funds for the

Ethnic Minority Local Church Missional Priority.

(The Committee on Advance and Education continues to review worthwhile projects in our Conference and make grants available through the EMLC Advance Funds. The last EMLC Advance Conference Offering totaled \$28,368.67 with \$14,184.34 retained for use in the Central Texas Annual Conference. The Committee granted funds to the following: a) salary supplement for Nelda Barett in the Conference Office b) salary supplement for Black church in Brownwood District c) Korean church in Killeen d) salary supplement for new Black congregation in Waxahachie District e) salary supplement for Black congregations in Temple District.)

3. To cooperate with the Committee on Communications and Interpretation in the

promotion of the Missional Priorities. (See #1.)

4. To provide training for the District Missionary Secretaries in conjunction with the 1979

Mission Saturation in the Annual Conference.

(The Committee feels that this goal was not accomplished to its fullest because of a lack of communication concerning the scope and nature of the Mission Saturation. Most District Missionary Secretaries reported that their districts had adequate representation for the district presentations.)

5. To work with the United Methodist Women in a cooperative School of Christian Mission by: a) an allocation to the budget of the school, b) planning for the school, c) requesting that

all District Missionary Secretaries attend the school at district expense.

(The Committee, out of its budgeted funds, granted \$1200.00 to the school. The Committee chairperson has worked in the various planning sessions and all district superintendents have been urged to send their District Missionary Secretaries at district expense.)

Committee On Advance And Education 1981 Program Goals

 To promote Advance Special Giving for: a) Missional priorities, b) General Advance Specials, c) Conference Advance Specials.

2. To receive applications for and make allocations of General Conference Advance Funds for the Ethnic Minority Local Church Missional Priority.

3. To cooperate with the Committee on Communications and Interpretation in the

promotion of the missional priorities.

- 4. To work with the United Methodist Women in a cooperative School of Christian Mission by: a) an allocation to the budget of the school, b) planning for the school, c) requesting that all District Missionary Secretaries attend the School of Christian Mission at district expense.
- 5. To implement a survey of mission activities and outreach in all Annual Conference local churches (through District Missionary Secretaries) and report findings to the Conference Council on Ministries where they will be compiled in booklet form and placed in the new Mission Resource Center.
 - 6. Creation of a Mission Resource Center for ideas for local missions.

- Creation and implementation of an additional conference-wide mission event with emphasis on "How to" in local missions.
 - Explore possibilities of an Annual Conference mission tour for the state of Texas.
- To promote local churches to become full supporting members of missionaries in the field.

RATIONALE:

 One of the major functions of the Committee is making literature and other material available concerning the various Advance Specials.

It is the duty of this Committee to receive applications for the use of EMLC Advance Special funds. All applications are reviewed, priorities set, and allocations made in accordance with the availability of funds.

3. This is an attempt to keep the lines of communication open and materials available for

the local pastors and churches.

- 4. The School of Christian Missions is currently the major tool we have for the education of the laity in missions. Therefore, the Committee makes allocation of funds from its budget for the School of Missions.
- 5. Research and Planning Committee has suggested a survey of mission and outreach activity in each local church. This material will be gathered by the District Missionary Secretary and placed in the new Missions Resource Center located in the Council on Ministries office. It will be available in booklet form to all churches.

6. Research and Planning Committee has also suggested a resource center for "Ideas in Mission" be created. This center shall be completed by June 1981. It will be located in the

Council on Ministries office.

- 7. It is the feeling of many in the Conference that an additional mission event is necessary to further the cause of missions in our Annual Conference. Part of the rationale for this event lies in the fact that many of our laity (a large portion of the men) do not attend the annual School of Missions. This mission event will be at least a day and a half in duration and probably will be located at Southwestern University in Georgetown. It will be conducted by national and conference leaders with an emphasis on "How to . . ." in local missions. All pastors, District Missionary Secretaries, Chairperson of Missions, Council on Ministries chairpersons and all others interested in missions will be invited to attend.
- 8. This would be an educational trip by chartered bus to various United Methodist institutions throughout the state of Texas.
- 9. Local churches with memberships less than 750 may become full supporting congregations of a missionary by contributing \$1.00 to \$3.00 per member, thus entitling them to schedule that missionary (on furlough) to speak in the local church. They would also receive periodic updates as to the work in the field.

Committee On Church Extension Review Of 1980 Goals

 Received and approved by ACCOM and is in the hands of cabinet — Capital Funds Drive.

2. We have devoted \$15,000 yearly for a number of years as part of matching program from General Board of Global Ministry. The money has two purposes: a) supports existing churches, b) accumulate money in hopes of purchasing property for new church development — possibly buy property this year. Money is currently with the Metropolitan Board of Missions.

3. Church has begun at the black church in Corsicana. Pastor was appointed in June, 1979. He is currently serving the existing congregation and will move to new congregation when church is built. They have purchased property and soon will build. Plans are with the architect.

4. Financial support ended in 1979 for St. Barnabas in Arlington.

5. Pastor has been appointed for the church in southwest Fort Worth. Wedgwood United Methodist Church will disband by June 1980 and new church will begin worship services by March 1980.

6. At rest with the cabinet and Committee on Research and Planning.

7. No progress.

8. Toured the southwest area on Friday, January 18, 1980.

Committee On Church Extension 1981 Program Goals

 To continue to support: a) Southeast Quadrant/Black Church development, b) Southwest Fort Worth new church, c) Corsicana Black church development, d) Watauga UMC salary supplement.

2. To be prepared to support ethnic language church development in the Central Texas

Conference such as: a) Asian, b) Native American, c) Hispanic.

Be prepared to respond to the results of the demographic study of the Conference currently underway by the Research and Planning Committee with respect to new church development.

RATIONALE:

1. Each of the named programs represents an ongoing project which this Committee supports.

2. This goal represents a response to increased need due to an influx of ethnic language groups in the Conference such as the Killeen Korean congregation, the movement of Native Americans into Fort Worth (current population estimated at 4,000) and rising population of Hispanic through the Conference.

3. The results of this study will enable the Committee to determine the needs raised in #2

above.

Committee on Ecumenical Affairs Goals For 1981

To continue to support the Texas Conference of Churches and Texas Impact.
 To encourage communication with ecumenical groups in the Conference area.

 To obtain from the District Superintendents in the Conference their suggestions on the need for and advisability of non-metropolitan ecumenical parishes within their districts.

4. To continue to monitor the St. Barnabas ecumenical project in Arlington and lend support for the proposed congregation in South Arlington with a pastor from the Presbyterian Church.

5. To request that the Central Texas Conference continue to have the sum of \$20,000 available from the Conference Operating Reserve Fund to be used to oppose any effort to legalize gambling in the state of Texas.

6. To present a report of the issues and decisions of the Texas Conference of Churches to

each local congregation.

7. To participate in the Mt. Sequoyah School of Ecumenical Ministries. RATIONALE:

The committee believes that it is important to maintain communications with other ecumenical organizations and that this can be promoted through Goals 1 and 2.

It is our opinion that it is important to have ecumenical parishes in both metropolitan and non-metropolitan areas where it is not practical for each denomination to maintain separate congregations. Therefore, we need to continue to look for opportunities to establish ecumenical churches and to learn from the St. Barnabas church. Goals 3 and 4 are intended to accomplish this.

The United Methodist Church opposes legalized gambling; thus we need to be prepared to

oppose it if it is proposed. Goal 5 is for this purpose.

The churches in our Conference need to be aware of the goals and activities of ecumenical groups such as the Texas Conference of Churches. Our committee needs also to keep up to date with the ecumenical training available in our own Conference. Goals 6 and 7 are to allow us to learn and to pass on to our conference churches the information we obtain.

Committee On Health And Welfare Goals For 1981

- To encourage each local church to designate a chairperson for Health and Welfare and each district to have such a person and to send a new list to the agencies related to the committee.
- 2. To encourage all districts in the Annual Conference to have a Health and Welfare Festival, in which church agency representatives may inform our people about their ministries.
- 3. To continue to publicize the work of the agencies related to our Committee through the Texas Methodist, especially to call attention to the times when special offerings are to be received for their support. To lift the level of giving to these agencies to more than offset the problem of inflation.

4. To encourage the inclusion of the agencies in personal estate planning.

5. To encourage all local churches to observe these special dates in telling the story of our institutions and to receive special offerings for them: April for Golden Cross; May for Wesleyan Home; November for Methodist Mission Home of Texas; December for Methodist Home in Waco.

6. To continue to support contributions to alleviate world hunger through UMCOR.

7. To make each church aware of the need to minister to the handicapped through intensive education and to provide information regarding the use of adaptive facilities and curriculum materials designed for the handicapped.

RATIONALE:

1. To provide agencies with direct contact with local churches.

2. To provide local membership education.

3. To encourage continued financial support of agencies.

4. To support long range agency needs.

5. To continue support of traditional annual offerings to agencies.

6. To remind congregations of continued need in this area.

7. To make churches aware of opportunities available to the handicapped.

Parish Development Goals For 1981

1. To continue to monitor and support the ARM Foundation.

To give guidance and support to the ARM Foundation in its attempt to establish a permanent fund.

To hold a Cooperative Ministries Seminar in the spring of 1981.

4. To emphasize Rural Life Sunday and Labor Sunday with program resources to be sent to local churches and articles in the Texas Methodist.

5. To give a Rural Church Improvement Award at the 1981 Annual Conference.

At some point in the future to employ a full-time staff person, either on an area or a conference basis.

RATIONALE:

 The ARM Foundation is doing a tremendous job for our Conference. To keep it related to the Conference, we will monitor its work.

Since the Conference no longer funds the ARM Foundation, we have approved their plans to seek for permanent fundings and will work with them in seeking to raise those funds.

3. The needs of small churches (under 250 members) is a continuing concern for our Conference. Through a "Cooperation Ministries Seminar," we hope to strengthen these small churches and help them more beyond a survival to a "growth in ministry" mind-set.

4. These two special days are important. We will provide resources to help our local

churches have relevant observations of them.

5. Another way to help small (under 250 members) churches gain in self-esteem is to provide guidelines for improvement and to recognize those doing a good job with awards at Annual Conference. The \$500.00 will be divided into two or three awards for: churches with less than fifty members; churches with 50-150 members, and ones with 150-250.

6. When the Annual Conference had a full-time Director of Rural Ministry, many good things happened across the Conference. There is a growing conviction that we need, as a Conference, to pay more attention to strengthening our small churches in rural and urban areas. We are not ready to propose such a staff position now, but want to bring it to the attention of the Conference as a proposal we will be presenting in the future.

Committee On Urban Ministries - Review of 1980

The committee conducted on site evaluations of the work of the agencies receiving support. In a special meeting, Mr. Homer Trevino, the Executive Director of the Waco United Way, discussed the role of volunteers in managing charitable funds. He briefly introduced the purchase of services approach to the distribution of funds. Lastly, the committee assessed the budget requests of the three agencies.

1981 Program Goals

 To involve individuals and congregations in Urban Ministries by providing opportunities through:

a. Visits to establish agencies of the church

b. Invitations issued to agencies to present programs in local churches.

c. Participation in agency projects, i.e., work camps and volunteer services.

To consider and administer financial requests having to do with urban ministries from the district and general church agencies and to promote funding for the approved causes.

3. To hear, at the spring meeting of the Board, the designated representatives of the

various related agencies' financial requests to the Annual Conference.

4. To encourage every white church that is in a community that has a local black United Methodist Church to endeavor to establish an IC-1 Program (Inner City-one unit of time) and every black United Methodist Church to endeavor to establish a SC-1 (Suburban Church-one unit of time) Program.

Promote youth summer mission projects within the Central Texas Annual Conference. Coordinating those experiences with United Community Centers, in Fort Worth, with Polytechnic United Methodist Church and with Texas Wesleyan College. Other areas

will also be sought out as work camp possibilities.

6. We encourage each local church to designate money in support of the United Community Centers, of Fort Worth, Laura Edwards Christian Day Care Center, of Waco, Waco Inner City Ministry. All of these are approved as Advance Specials. UCC is also a recipient of monies from the Women's Division and from the National Division of the General Board of Global Ministries.

Rationale for Agency Support

United Community Centers: UCC operates five centers in areas in need of social services which will promote self-development. Neighborhood councils participate in decisions which affect their respective programming. The budget for UCC, as others in such fields, is being strangled by inflation. The request for \$12,000 barely offsets the inflationary pressures. The United Way of Fort Worth has asked for the UMC to show good faith by carrying more of the cost of operations.

Laura Edwards Christian Day Care Center: This agency provides quality child care and learning concept readiness for the children of parents with various levels of income. A sliding fee compensates for the differences in income. The request for \$8,000 is a result of the termination of a national grant for such services even though the need continues. The United Way of Waco has moved to the concept of "purchase of services," rather than deficit financing. The result is a reduction of income, since monies only come as subsidies for the

lowest income children, rather than an overall program support.

Waco Inner City Ministry: A three-pronged program, two of which are related to feeding the indigent elderly, constitute their agency's program. Meals on Wheels presently serves over 50,000 meals a year to the infirm and destitute. The Senior Luncheon Activity Program operates in six communities other than Waco. This basically rural program is meeting the needs of 325 older persons. They also receive a variety of other services including counselling, transportation, legal services, and periodic health screening. The third prong of their service is the Open Closet. It is a volunteer serving project providing school clothes to hundreds of underprivileged children. The request for \$6,000, which is the same as for 1980, indicates a present high level of government funding, which has covered the rising costs of food and fuel.

Time-Line of 1981 Goals

By May of 1980, a list of youth summer work projects in connection with UCC should be in the hands of all pastors in the Conference. Mr. J. Douglas O'Brien is in charge of preparing the list. In April of 1980, conversations between one black and one white UMC in Fort Worth should have begun. Reverend Richard M. Freeman is in charge of making the initial contacts.

Budget requests from related agencies to be in the hands of the committee by January 15, 1981.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES Harris And Hurst-Euless-Bedford Hospitals Annual Report

Seventy-four percent of the hospitals in the United States are under one-hundred beds. Harris Hospital-Methodist, with 628 beds, is in the top ten percent of the large health-care facilities in the nation. Also, Harris is the eleventh largest maternity hospital in this country.

The three other hospitals in the Harris Hospital-Methodist System, H.E.B. North (Hurst-Euless-Bedford), H.E.B. South, and E.M.A.S.H. (Eagle Mountain Area Suburban Hospital) have bed capacities of 117, 95 and 22, respectively. The four hospitals have a total of 862 beds.

The four hospitals combined have a payroll of \$30,706,289.00, a budget of \$64,389,156.00,

and a total of 2,738 employees.

In October, 1979, Harris Hospital-Methodist launched one of the most significant programs in her 50 year history — "CareFlite." This Helicopter Ambulance Service covers Southern Oklahoma, North Texas, Central Texas and West Texas. There are 1300 Specialist Physicians in this geographical area, and 91% of them are in the Fort Worth-Dallas area. Eighty-five percent of all critical care beds are in the Metroplex, and 62% of the 274 ground-ambulances are also in the Fort Worth-Dallas area. This means that CareFlite provides the most essential life-saving service to thousands of residents throughout Texas and Oklahoma.

To meet the increasing needs of emergency care, produced by both CareFlite and a growing population, our Emergency Medicine Department has entered into a \$1,400,000.00 expansion and renovation program. This department offers full 24-hour emergency care,

and boasts a staff of 13 Physicians, who are specialists in Emergency Medicine.

The Department of Radiology is now complete, and is one of the finest in the Southwest. The installation of the most modern equipment makes this department capable of meeting every technical need. The Total Body Scanner, Head Scanner, Ultra-sound Scanner and Real-Time Scanner have added a new dimension to the department and its tremendous diagnostic skills. This year more than 224,000 Radiological procedures were performed and, with the construction now completed, these services will be dramatically increased.

The entire Phase V program, for \$12,000,000.00, will be completed within this year of 1980. This will make Harris Hospital-Methodist one of the truly great medical centers in the Southwest, superior in its diagnostic abilities, surgical skills and every known specialized

medical procedure.

Excellence For The Eighties

I. INTRODUCTION

On November 9, 1980, Methodist Home will celebrate ninety years of service to children. This will certainly be a great milestone in the life of the Methodist Church. As Administrator of the Methodist Home, I feel it is my responsibility to express to those countless numbers of people who have made this ministry possible the appreciation of the present staff and children of the Methodist Home, as well as all of those who have gone before us.

I am reminded of a fellow who was talking about travelling down the highway. He said, "I can read figures but I can't read writing; so when I am on the road, I always know how far, but not where to go." We can look at the records and see where Methodist Home has come from and how long it has taken to get where we are today, but I want to take a look where we have been in relation to where we are going and point the way for the challenge that lies ahead of us. I want to propose a program which will be known by the title of "Excellence In The Eighties."

I am not enough of a prophet to give you specific examples of what might happen as we travel the road of the eighties, but I do believe I can study the signs of the times and make some predictions about what will happen and what we must do to be a vital force in child care for the next decade. The most important element of our ministry is that it is set in the context of the United Methodist Church and the Christian faith. When I think of this heritage, I am reminded of two passages of scripture which I believe can be combined in a valid way to be our road map for the eighties.

In Matthew's gospel we read where Jesus stated that something extra would be demanded of his disciples. In the 5th chapter, verses 46-48 we read:

"For if you love those who love you, what reward have you? Do not even the tax collectors do the same? And if you salute only your brethren, what more are you doing than others? Do not even the Gentiles do the same? You, therefore must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect."

I am firmly convinced that, because we profess to be a Christian child care agency, we must maintain a quality of excellence that is second to none. The second verse I am

reminded of is the last verse in the 12th chapter of Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians which precedes the famous "love" chapter. It reads, "And I will show you a still more excellent way." I am firmly convinced that the extra in child care has to be the foundation for the program of "Excellence For The Eighties."

II. TRENDS IN CHILD CARE

As we look toward the eighties, we must be aware of the trends in child care. I feel that most of you are aware of the rapid changes in child care, but many people have found it difficult to visualize just how revolutionary they are. There are still those who think of our Home as an orphanage in which children who have no families come to live. Let me list some current trends.

- Most of the children in care do have families, and their families do not want to give them up. Very few are actually orphan or even half orphan. The majority of our boys and girls have a living parent, but for some reason their parent cannot provide for them at this time. The reasons include family breakdown, illness, alcoholism, poverty, crime and many others.
- 2. The turnover rate tells us that Methodist Home serves as a temporary place for a child to live. As the median age of children coming into the Home increases, turnovers are more frequent because older children do not need placement as long as younger ones. More of the older children are in the custody of the state. The state has increasingly let the child have a major part in making decisions about placement. The resulting lack of cooperation dilutes the ability of the Home to retain youth long enough for appropriate adjustment.
- 3. Our ministry tries to help children and families solve their problems. We recommend that a family first try to work through their problems with professional help to keep the family together. Many times, boys and girls must be removed from their homes for a period of time, but every effort is made to maintain contact with the family.
- 4. Fewer dependent boys and girls are being placed in institutions. We can care for 8 to 16 children in a homeunit where formerly we could manage successfully as many as 24 in a cottage. In addition, there has been an inordinate and unrealistic emphasis on "de-institutionalization of children." Most community resources have been created to deal with families and children in crisis. Youth services have been started in almost every community. Anti-institutionalism has been expounded by books such as Weeping In The Playtime of Others by Ken Wooden. A few institutions have been cited for abuse and neglect, causing reflections on all children's homes.
- 5. More and more moderately to severely disturbed children and adolescents are being referred to Methodist Home. There is a need for homes that can handle the emotionally disturbed, psychologically troubled and physically aggressive youth. We have worked diligently to develop special facilities and programs for the more disturbed. Additional guidance is required because of school problems, separation trauma, low self-esteem, behavioral difficulties and emotional abuse at the hands of adults. Those who have experienced neglect, deprivation, or abuse need the order and structure of group living. We also help those who have been hurt by adults and cannot bear the closeness of family living.
- 6. The need for institutional service for children will continue. With increasing stress on the family unit, associated with marital problems, unemployment and lack of parenting skills, there will still be a need for our services. Our program has changed and will continue to change, but I have great confidence that there will always be a place for Methodist Home to serve.

III. THREE ELEMENTS OF A PROGRAM FOR THE EIGHTIES In the scripture reference concerning love, Paul tells us: "And now abideth faith, hope

and love but the greatest of these is love." These elements have and will shape our program of child care.

- 1. "By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to go out to a place which he was to receive as an inheritance, and he went out, not knowing where he was to go."
 - It was this same element of faith that launched the Methodist Home back in 1890. Little did they know when David knocked on Dr. W. H. Vaughan's door that Methodist Home would develop as it has in this period of time. It would be impossible to list all of the examples of faith in action, but when you see the beauty of this campus you realize that the buildings and programs are results of faith in action. Ours is not a pioneering world when it comes to material things, but I am convinced that excellence in the eighties will be determined in large measure by the faith which all of us have in Almighty God and in our work that puts that faith into action. We have a goodly heritage in the faith of our fathers. I only hope that our faith today will be a great heritage for those who follow us. As I read David's Legions, I am reminded of a quote "Our forebearers have bequeathed to us a great child care program through their vision and sacrifice. Let us not fail the future Davids, the on-coming generations of boys and girls. It will require time and energy to take the 'long look' and use the opportunity to serve these children to the fullest. We must realize a quality of child care that brings life over death, hope over despair, renewal over decay and purpose and direction to those who are lost."
- 2. A second element of excellence for the eighties will be the element of hope. The promise of a second chance and a new start in life is the foundation of the program of Methodist Home. If we cannot offer hope for a better life, then we had better stop and re-group. I am reminded of a song that our children's choir sings, "I Am A Promise." This is what it is all about. Listen to the words of hope:

"I am a promise, I am a possibility,
I am a promise with a capital "P"
I am a great big bundle of potentiality
and I am learning to hear God's voice
and I am trying to make the right choices —
I'm a promise to be anything God wants me to be."

3. Paul concluded by saying "... but the greatest of these is love." If Methodist Home's program is not built on Christian love, then it is nothing. The love of Christ that proved itself in action is the base for our program of child care. We have to be more than noisy gongs and clanging cymbals. We have to be servants of a Christ that changed history because of his love in action. We can change lives of children as we convey this love to them. We are dealing with human personalities, precious in God's sight and in our sight, and though many of them are damaged before we see them, it is amazing what plain, ordinary Christian love, compassion and influence can still do in the lives of those with whom we live and work. Somehow it all seems to boil down to a matter of relationships — adult to child — child to adult. Once that begins to shine through, we are absolutely certain we are making progress.

Every effort is made to hold on to the child's family for him, or her, and many times the child and this family can be reunited and make satisfactory progress. Other times this is impossible for one reason or another, but we can help the child and the family hold on to whatever strengths are there, so that the child will know from whence he came and will not feel estranged from his natural family.

Jesus in love dealt with those in need, the sick, the lame, the sinner, the troubled and those that hurt. Our Christian ministry of child care can do no less.

By-Laws

The Methodist Home Board of Directors approved a revision of the Methodist Home By-Laws. These revisions to be ratified by the patronizing annual conferences. (Full text of By-Laws Revision of 1978 have been placed in the hands of the Conference Secretary). The substantive change is as follows:

(The underlined phrase is the additional information) that needs to be added in order for

us to comply with the Certification Council standards.

Article I. Section 1

"The purpose of Methodist Home is the charitable care and ministration for children residing within the bounds of the patronizing Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church. To carry out this purpose the Board of Directors shall have the authority and responsibility to develop and direct a program of child care which shall effectively meet the needs of the children served. This program may include institutional care, foster home care, adoption services, group homes services, residential treatment for emotionally disturbed children and youth, social services for children in their homes, and any other services which the Board of Directors shall deem appropriate in meeting the needs of children and youth. The program shall evidence its concern for persons of all religious, social, economic, cultural, racial, and ethnic groups in its constituent community and shall not discriminate in its policies of admission, program, and budget. The name of this corporation, its corporate purpose and terms of its existence are set forth in the restated Articles of Incorporation of this corporation as filed with the Secretary of State of the State of Texas, on the 13th day of May, 1968, as the same may from time to time be amended. All provisions of these By-Laws are subject to the provisions of the Articles of Incorporation."

Methodist Mission Home Report No. 1

Approved 6-3-80

The Methodist Mission Home provides services for young women pregnant out of wedlock, and vocational rehabilitation services for young adults with hearing impairments. The HOME also provides short and long term care for infant children and places infants for

adoption in homes approved by the Social Work Staff.

The ministry at the Southwest Maternity Center includes counseling, medical care, room and board, provision for continuing education if in high school, and legal services when they desire to place their babies for adoption. The services expanded the past year through the satellite house in Odessa. Changing times has brought about the fact that over 50% of the placements for adoption were from non-resident young women who want adoptive planning through a licensed agency for their child, but do not need the services of the facility.

Services in Nacogdoches have been converted into a counseling center, whereby one of our Social Workers in that area can meet with the young women for counseling. Currently there is also counseling staff in Longview, Houston and Midland, and soon there will be Staff

located in the Temple area.

The Maple Organization, composed of Adoptive Parents of the Methodist Mission Home, is a very important part of the life of the maternity and adoption program, helping with

public relations across the State of Texas and New Mexico.

Services for clients at the Southwest Center for the Hearing Impaired includes a residential individualized adult basic education program that helps train the clients in functional academic subjects and communication skills, vocational counseling and training, and ultimately job placement. Each client receives comprehensive vocational evaluation. It also includes personal social adjustment, medical care, as needed; and planned semi-independent living experiences.

The HOME continues to give consideration to those who cannot afford the normal costs. Work scholarships are available for maternity residents. Two grants which subsidized the hearing impaired program were not renewed, so the HOME will be calling more on the churches and soliciting funds/grants from foundations toward these vital programs.

Adoptive fees are reduced for the hard to place child.

In 1979, the Southwest Maternity Center served 753 persons in a direct way: 137 children, 224 maternity clients, and 246 adoptive parents; and the Southwest Center for the Hearing Impaired had a total of 148 clients to participate in their program. Besides these directly served, there was a large number of family members of the hearing impaired clients that were involved.

The total resident days at the Methodist Mission Home during 1979 amounted to 29,083,

with an average occupancy of 80 residents per day.

The total operating budget for the HOME in 1979 amounted to \$1,457,071. The total Conference giving (seven Conferences) for 1979 was \$170,936.10, and we commend the 105

churches in the Central Texas Conference that gave \$15,197.13 of this amount. All churches are urged to include this vital work in their giving during the remainder of this Conference year.

Proposed Change In By-Laws

Accepted 6-3-80

The following addition to the By-Laws was approved by the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Mission Home at the Spring Board meeting on May 7, 1980, and we will appreciate your submitting this addition for ratification by the Central Texas Annual Conference:

ARTICLE I (General statement)

Section 5 (NEW)

Waco Inner City Ministry Report No. 1

With the support of the Central Texas Conference during 1979, Inner City Ministry continued its challenge of providing direct services and stimulating social concern throughout Waco and McLennan County. Our programs showed a significant increase in the number of persons served. These programs included:

 MEALS ON WHEELS: 300 homebound elderly persons received hot noon meals three days a week in the Waco area. Hundreds of volunteers were utilized to cook and deliver these meals from twelve sites. Approximately 45,000 meals were served in 1979.

 SENIOR LUNCH AND ACTIVITY PROGRAM: over 300 senior citizens in rural McLennan County participated daily in six senior centers located in West, Mart, Axtell, Moody, McGregor, and Crawford. The participants received hot lunches and took part in educational and recreational activities. Approximately 70,000 meals were served in this program in 1979.

SENIOR CITIZEN TRANSPORTATION: transportation was provided to 2,100
unduplicated riders each month in 1979. Rural McLennan County residents received
rides to doctor's offices, grocery stores, utility offices, Social Security offices, and
senior centers. The total number of rides provided in 1979 was approximately 21,600.

4. SUMMER YOUTH CAMP: Inner City Ministry co-sponsored with other agencies a day camp and a resident camp in the summer of 1979. An average of 621 inner city children in Waco participated daily in the day camp, and 250 children participated in the resident camp. Volunteer sewing groups coordinated by our agency provided clothing for these campers. The financial support of Inner City Ministry by the Conference enabled these important programs to operate in 1979. The Board of Directors and Staff of Inner City Ministry pledge to continue this tradition of service and good stewardship of Conference resources.

Laura Edwards Christian Community Center Report No. 1

The Laura Edwards Christian Community Center in Waco is a child care center serving a predominately black residential area. It is licensed to serve 115 children from ages 2-12 and is opened from 6:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. to better serve the working parents. The children's fees are determined by a sliding scale based on family income and the number in a family. More than half live in the poverty income level.

The Center provides physical care and academic readiness preparation for the children in the preschool program and after school care for the older children. Along with daily health checks, dental, hearing, speech, and eye screening clinics are held yearly. Academic

objectives are:

 To expose the children to various ideas, values, materials, and knowledge outside of their environment.

To develop habits of observation.

3. To increase an awareness and an understanding of their emotions.

To develop skills that lend to self confidence.

To prepare the child for formal school.

The summer program includes tutoring in math and reading for the older children. All this is accomplished through the dedicated staff and volunteers under the leadership of Ms. Vera Morris, the executive director. Training sessions are held weekly for the teachers during the children's naptime.

A goal for the Center has been for the public to be more aware of the Laura Edwards Christian Community Center and the service it is providing for the community. This has been accomplished through the following activities this year. The Christmas program and spring operetta were on television. The cherub chorus and a slide presentation by volunteers from the Board provide programs for churches and civic groups. The Center sponsored an "Outstanding People in Waco Week" which not only taught children about community helpers, but also acquainted Waco people with the Center.

The Board of Directors is a working board with representatives from the community being served, the church, and the community at large. The increased Conference Grant from \$5,000 to \$7,500 for 1979 is greatly appreciated along with the advanced specials and the United Methodist Women's support. This helps provide scholarships for the children who

are unable to pay the full fee. With your help we are training leaders of tomorrow.

This past year has been a good one in that a number of objectives have been achieved. We have reached a financial stability in our operations enabling us to direct our attention to strengthening, upgrading and expanding our service programs. Even though much was

accomplished during this past year, much more remains to be done.

I would like to commend the staff of our homes because it is their efforts and devotion to their duty that makes our entire program successful. We would also express our appreciation to our board and to the people of the conference for their support of our Ministries. We pray that you will be diligent in spreading the word about the Wesleyan and encouraging people to take advantage of the services we offer. We have several vacancies in the Retirement Home that need to be filled.

Achievements:

1. In the area of finance, 1979 was our first year with our new budgeting system. I believe that it is safe to say that the Wesleyan Homes have now attained a stable and sound financial position.

2. Throughout the past year, we have continued to upgrade the two homes by using our own staff. We have a full maintenance program with competent staff. Special attention is being given to energy conservation with several projects completed. The buildings and grounds are continually being made more attractive.

3. During 1979 the Wesleyan Retirement Home served 112 persons while the Nursing Home has served 134. The Nursing Home is filled to capacity with a sizable waiting list. The Retirement Home has 86 residents at this time. We need your assistance in securing persons to fill the vacancies we have.

Review Of Goals And Objectives:

Day by day demands have prevented us from accomplishing goals which we set last year and had hoped to complete by this time. We hope to accomplish them in the near future.

Mr. Chris Spence, a graduate student in 'long term care administration' from North Texas State University, has joined our staff on February 4th and will be doing a seven month internship at our two homes.

We have changed auditors and have contracted part of the bookkeeping out to an Austin

firm.

The coming year again represents much work. Our staff has developed more capabilities this past year and we are continuing to grow professionally. Our reputation is the best and this reflects on the good quality of care giving by a dedicated and caring staff.

Proposed Structure Change With Approval Of The Cabinet And The Council On Finance And Administration

Approved 6-3-80

THERE SHALL BE A CENTRAL TEXAS CONFERENCE "DIRECTOR OF FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION" WHO SHALL —

- A. Be the "Secretary" of the annual conference and responsible for:
 - 1. Keeping all official records of the annual conference, including,
 - a. accurate minutes of the sessions of the annual conference, and,
 - compiling, editing, proof-reading and publishing a conference journal as near August 1st of each year as possible.
 - Maintaining accurate records of the years of service, pension credits, etc., for the personnel, lay and clergy, of the annual conference;
 - 3. Fulfilling the duties prescribed in the current Discipline; the Standing Rules of the conference as described in paragraphs I,1.3.1; I,1.7; II,1.2.1.; II,19.1; II,20.1.2; III,3.4; IV,7; and, such others as may be approved by the annual conference subsequent to the formulation of this job description.
- B. Be the "Treasurer" of the annual conference and responsible for:
 - Keeping accurate financial records for the organizations of the conference, including,
 - a. receiving, verifying, depositing and providing an accounting for all receipts of the conference from all sources;
 - administering the budget of the conference as approved by its annual or special sessions or as directed under special circumstances by the Council on Finance and Administration, including,
 - the issuance of checks upon receipt of properly completed vouchers executed by those authorized to submit same or in conformity with the approved budget of the conference or the special directions of C. F. & A.;
 - the provision of a monthly printout of the financial position of each budgeted organizational body, said printout being placed in the hands of the chairpersons of the respective units;
 - the investment of surplus funds in interest-bearing accounts, per the policy of the Council on Finance and Administration;
 - iv. such other duties as may be necessary to assure the conference of a safe and expeditious budgetary process;
 - Functioning in an advisory capacity to all agencies of the conference relating to the investment of the fiscal resources of the conference;
 - Assisting the Council on Finance and Administration in the development of annual and long-range budgets for the conference;
 - Requiring an annual audit of the records of each district and agency of the annual conference:
 - 5. Providing the appropriate tax forms for the employees of the conference;
 - 6. Fulfilling the duties prescribed in the current Discipline; the Standing Rules of the conference as described in paragraphs III,3.1; IV,2; IV,10; Equitable Salaries 9 and 10; and, such others as may be approved by the annual conference subsequent to the formulation of this job description.

C. Function as "Stewardship Consultant" of the annual conference and responsible for:

1. Being a resource person to local churches by

- a. accumulating, studying and evaluating existing financial campaign materials, and,
- recommending those which match the circumstances and needs of the local church;
- 2. Enabling districts and local churches to better understand the budgetary items and financial policies which have been approved by the annual conference:

Working with the Council on Finance and Administration and the Annual Conference Council on Ministries in the development of an ongoing,

comprehensive stewardship program for the conference.

IN REGARD TO THIS PROPOSAL, THE STANDING RULES OF THE CONFERENCE, AS STATED UNDER III. CONFERENCE ADMINISTRATION, CONFERENCE SECRETARY-TREASURER, AS FOUND ON PAGE 209 OF THE 1979 JOURNAL WILL NEED TO BE CHANGED IN EACH INSTANCE WHERE THE TERM "CONFERENCE SECRETARY-TREASURER" APPEARS SO AS TO REFLECT THE NEW TITLE, "DIRECTOR OF FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION" WITH THE ADDITION OF ONE ADDITIONAL RULE WHICH SHALL BECOME 3.5 AND READ AS FOLLOWS:

The job description of the Director of Finance and Administration may be modified upon recommendation of the conference's Council on Finance and Administration and

approval of the annual conference in regular or called session.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE OFFICE OF DIRECTOR OF FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION:

The Director should have formal training in accounting principles or demonstrated a
proficiency in this area of responsibility;

The Director should have an interest in investment procedures, insurance planning, pension programs, and such other fields as would enhance his/her ability to fulfill the duties and responsibilities described in the job description;

3. The Director should have a working knowledge of available and successful

stewardship programs, including financial campaigns;

 The Director should be a United Methodist of highest moral character and impeccable reputation.

The salary allowances for the Director of Finance and Administration shall be computed in the same manner as that of the district superintendent.

6. Travel shall be vouchered.

Approved 6-3-80

JOB DESCRIPTION FOR THE DIRECTOR OF THE COMMISSION ON CHURCH GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT:

- Accumulate and assess demographic information pertaining to every segment of the Central Texas Conference for the purpose of . . .
 - a. Determining the changes in population density,

b. Discerning the areas of transition.

c. Recognizing changes in the age-sex distribution, and,

d. Calling attention to fluctuations in economics, industrialization, and other factors which might impact the life and ministry of the congregations of the annual conference. Recommend strategies to districts and local churches which are affected by the findings of #1 above, such as,...

a. The need to purchase new church sites,

b. The need to relocate existing congregations,

c. The merger of existing congregations,

d. The closing of churches.

 The remodeling of existing facilities in order to accommodate changes in circumstances and conditions,

f. Redevelopment of existing congregations in areas of transition.

- Develop and implement a promotional program designed to make the annual conference aware of the Church Growth and Development program in order to . . .
 - a. Secure the desired number of SHARES in the respective districts,
 - b. Promote the remittance of the apportioned portion of the program,

Cultivate persons capable of donating land, securities and/or cash.

4. Prepare and submit to the Commission on Church Growth and Development an annual financial proposal having to do with an operational plan including:

a. Time lined quantitative programatic goals

b. Share Goals for the ensuing year

c. APPORTIONMENT requests for the ensuing year,

d. A Commission on Church Growth and Development budget for the ensuing year.

- 5. Funds received on behalf of the Church Growth and Development program shall be deposited with the Conference Treasurer in accordance with normal fiscal procedures of the annual conference and dispersed according to the directions of the Director of Church Growth and Development per the policy and approval of the Commission on Church Growth and Development.
- 6. Prepare and present an annual report to the session of the Central Texas Conference.

7. Maintain all necessary records and prepare legal documents, as necessary.

- Provide monthly financial statements to the Commission on Church Growth and Development.
- Maintain all undeveloped sites per the requirements of the local governmental requirements.
- Provide guidance and counsel in the establishment of new congregation or the relocation of an existing congregation by . . .

a. Helping secure qualified architectural assistance.

- b. Assisting in the preparation of necessary legal documents,
- c. Providing guidance in the acquisition of available loans, grants,

Recommending reputable construction firms.

 Providing counsel in the design of facilities relative to required and recommended standards of city, county, state, and federal governments,

f. Calling attention to perceived needs to which the congregation should be prepared

to respond.

- Provide guidance and counsel in the redevelopment of existing congregations in areas of transition by . . .
 - Enabling the congregation to accurately assess the needs and resources which coexist in their immediate area,
 - Helping to sensitize the congregations regarding ways their resources can be used to meet those needs.
 - Making available information and assistance regarding skills and aid available throughout every level of the church and society.
- 12. Respond to requests from the respective districts for information and assistance.
- Promote and conduct church growth seminars to aid pastors and congregations to establish effective systems of evangelism.
- 14. Financial remuneration for the office of Director of Church Growth and Development shall come from the apportioned funds of the Church Growth and Development

program, including the costs of operating the office. The remuneration shall include salary, travel, and housing, the latter provided only in those cases where the director is clergy.

Salary- Shall be computed on the same basis as that of the district superintendent.

Travel- Vouchered at 15¢ per mile

Housing-\$7,200

- 15. Tenure shall be same as that of a District Superintendent (6 years consecutively).

 JOB DESCRIPTION FOR THE SECRETARY OF THE DIRECTOR OF CHURCH GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT:
 - Manage the office facilities of the Director of Commission on Church Growth and Development by . . .
 - a. Being responsible for the usual secretarial duties, such as typing, maintaining an adequate filing system, answering the telephone, functioning as a receptionist, reproducing documents, processing mail, etc.,

b. Making out requisitions for supplies and insuring their adequacy at all times,

c. Keeping of accurate financial records,

d. Maintaining the orderly appearance of the facility.

Remuneration for this position shall be derived from the apportioned funds of the Church Growth and Development program.

Recommendation for 1980-1981:

Salary - \$8,000 (based on a forty hour week)

OPERATING BUDGET FOR 1981

1. The operating budget for the program of Church Growth and Development will come

from the apportioned funds.

 Upon formation of the Commission on Church Growth and Development following the June, 1980, annual conference, the Executive Director shall submit to said Commission a proposed operating budget for 1981. Upon the Commission's approval, the budget shall be submitted to the annual conference Council on Finance and Administration for final authorization.

PROCEDURE:

1. The Director will meet with any existing local congregation as he/she begins any

proposal affecting that church. The D.S. shall be included in this meeting.

2. When the Director of Church Growth and Development has completed the preparation of a proposal, he/she will present the proposal to a regular quarterly meeting of the Commission on Church Growth and Development or request a meeting of the commission. The Executive Committee may deal with proposals when circumstances make it impossible or impractical to have a meeting of the full commission. Actions taken by the Executive Committee shall be submitted to the next full meeting of the commission.

Upon receiving a favorable response from the Commission on Church Growth and Development, the Director will request a hearing before the District Committee on

Church Building and Locations of the district to which the proposal applies.

 Following the positive action of the district committee, the Director will meet with any local congregation which will be affected by the approved proposal. The District

Superintendent shall be included in this meeting.

The Director will report to the presiding Bishop at each regularly scheduled cabinet meeting as to approved proposals, pending proposals, and anticipated proposals. The superintendents whose districts are affected by the proposals will join the Director in the reporting process.

MEMBERSHIP OF THE COMMISSION ON CHURCH GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT

OF THE CENTRAL TEXAS CCONFERENCE:

1. Presiding Bishop

2. The seven district superintendents;

3. One lay person and one clergy from each district, but these shall be from separate churches.

NOTE: In the selection of lay persons a deliberate effort shall be made to select persons with expertise in the areas of finance, architecture, real estate, building construction, and law.

4. Two persons of ethnic background and two women if not represented among the

persons selected in #3 above.

5. Lay representatives from the respective districts shall be named by the District Nominating Committee. 6. The Commission shall elect from among its members the following officers:

Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, and Secretary.

7. There shall be one STANDING COMMITTEE: The Research Committee.

An Agreement Of Trust Between

The New Church Growth And Development Program

The Metropolitan Board Of Missions Of Tarrant Co.

1. The Metropolitan Board stays in place, but with changes in function, funding, and staffing. Some of the changes will require amendments of the by-laws, but, as far as can presently be determined, no changes in the charter (Articles of Incorporation).

2. The Board of Directors of the Metropolitan Board would, by proper amendment of the by-laws, be made to include in its membership representation from District Committees on Church Development for the two Fort Worth districts, together with the present representation from district boards of church location and building.

3. The Board of Directors of the Metropolitan Board could then function as a bi-district agency for church development, much as it does presently, at the same time fitting

the pattern of the new conference plan.

4. The conference director of church growth and development will consult regularly with the Metropolitan Board on matters related to church development, just as he/she will with District Committees on Church Development in the other districts.

5. The Metropolitan Board would have an executive secretary who would have administrative responsibilities along with responsibility for urban ministries. The Metropolitan Board will have the prerogative of selecting this person and setting the remuneration, in consultation with the presiding bishop.

6. For the remainder of 1980 the Metropolitan Board will retain its income sources and

maintain its program commitments.

7. Beginning with the SHARE appeal early in 1981, the Metropolitan Board SHARES will be geared into the new conference-wide program. Every effort will be made to carry over into the conference program current Metropolitan Board SHARES.

8. From the Conference Commission's resources the Metropolitan Board will receive annually an amount sufficient to maintain an office, employ an executive secretary,

and adequately fund urban ministries.

9. The Annual Conference will assume all the Metropolitan Board's current contingency

obligations . . . i.e. become guarantor on church loans.

10. The conference will assume, on Jan. 1, 1981, all the Metropolitan Board's program commitments relating to new church development, including remaining indebtedness on properties, which, at that time, are being utilized in new church development.

11. The conference commission will assume responsibility for EMLC supplements and

development.

12. Land which the Metropolitan Board owns as of Jan. 1, 1981, (presently this is five sites totaling almost 30 acres, not including portions of the Covenant and Barnabas properties to which the Board retains title) will be made available to the conference for future new church development.

13. There will be retained, as of Dec. 31, 1980, an operating reserve for the Metropolitan

Board approximately equal to 6 months of the negotiated 1981 budget.

- 14. Grant moneys already approved by the CTC Board of Global Ministries for 1981 will be used for the purposes designated. Attempts will be made to retain National Division commitments to the new church in SE Fort Worth.
- 15. Permanent Fund interest earnings would come to the Metropolitan Board for general budget use.
- 16. Metropolitan Board funds now designated to the Executive Directors salary package not needed to cover the compensation of the Metropolitan Board executive secretary will be made available for application to the remuneration of the conference director of church growth and development for the period of June 1, 1980 thru Dec. 31, 1980.

An Agreement Of Trust Between

The New Church Growth And Development Program

And

The Inner-City Ministries Of Waco District

A similar agreement in principle shall prevail as that between the Commission on Church Growth and Development and the Metropolitan Board of Missions of Tarrant Co. as related to in-place ministries to the inner city of Waco, Texas.

Financial Support Of The

Church Growth And Development Program

The financial resources for the Church Growth and Development Program will be generated by two sources:

- I. A Conference-wide apportionment of \$200,000 to be distributed in the same manner as other conference apportionments.
 - It should be noted that this is not all "new money." The Fort Worth districts are already contributing \$74,000 which will be converted to this program. Therefore, the new fund will create \$126,000 in new resources.
- II. A Conference-wide SHARE PROGRAM:

The ultimate goal of the program is to secure a total of 10,000 SHARES. The goal will be based upon a ratio of one share for every twelve (12) members in the local church. Each share will represent an annual financial commitment of FORTY-FIVE dollars, payable in three equal installments or in one payment.

Existing share programs in the respective districts of the conference will be converted to the new program. Each current shareholder will be contacted relative to their permission to make this conversion.

Report No. 3

Approved 6-3-80

Introduction

During the 1978 session of the Central Texas Conference the Research and Planning Committee asked lay and clergy members of the conference to indicate by use of a questionnaire the issues which they felt most needful of the attention of the annual conference. Those who responded identified five areas of concern: (1) STRENGTHENING OF THE CHURCH SCHOOL/TEACHER TRAINING; (2) MEMBERSHIP RECRUIT-MENT/REACTIVATION OF THE INACTIVE; (3) STRENGTHENING OF WOR-SHIP/STRENGTHENING OF PREACHING; (4) STRENGTHENING OF SPIRITUAL EN-RICHMENT/STEWARDSHIP: (5) LOCAL MISSIONS.

Since the completion of that questionnaire more than 800 persons have spent in excess of 2300 hours and an incalculable number of hours of travel in an effort to make an adequate response to those five areas of critical need.

This report is the fruits of our labors and presented in hopes that it represents a challenge and stimulus for all of us.

To the 800 persons who labored faithfully, the members of the Committee on Research and Planning, the Bishop and the Cabinet, the Conference Staff, Matt Brown, our consultant, and the Strategic Planning Committee, a hearty THANK YOU for your time, energy, and commitment to Christ which has prompted you to give so freely and willingly of yourselves.

BOARD OF PENSIONS Report No. 1

Adopted 6-3-80

One area of the church's responsibility that is among the most deficient is the area of pensions. It is no credit to our great church and this Central Texas Conference in particular that current provision for retired ministers, widows and survivors is less than the nationally accepted poverty level. No person should be expected to exist on the current \$100 per service year. The rate is in no way consistent with the cost of living.

Fortunately we are showing signs of "a light at the end of the tunnel." The Board optimistically projects an increase of fifteen percent in the annuity rate for 1981. We

recommend the rate be set at \$115 for each service year.

Another good sign is a proposed new plan of pensions being proposed by the General Board of Pensions. If approved by the General Conference and ratified by the various conferences, it will see all future years funded at not less than \$155 per service year.

As we conclude this quadrennium, we are proud of progress made. Four years ago the annuity rate was \$85 with dismal prospects for any great raise. Thanks to an increased awareness on the part of the conference, the Capital Funds Campaign and some other factors, this period has seen the greatest increase in the rate in our conference history.

The Capital Funds drive receipts have reached the \$1,100,000 mark with a bit more than a year to go. Hopefully the remaining \$400,000 will be in by the end of the period projected at

the beginning of the effort, the fall of 1981.

As we report this conference, some of us who have given a service of love to the pension program of the conference will be leaving that responsibility. To all who leave the Board, and especially to J. W. Sprinkle, I would express praise and gratitude. Dr. Sprinkle has done a tremendous job in this area and the conference ministry will be forever grateful.

- Request of the Board of Diaconal Ministry that the membership of the Commission on Equitable Salaries and Clergy Benefits include a representative of the Board of Diaconal Ministry.

BOARD OF LAY CONCERNS Report No. 1 Recommendations

Adopted 6-3-80

The Conference Commission for Lay Concerns recommends:

 The by-laws and organizational pattern of the Conference and District Commissions for Lay Concerns be altered as reflected by the attached document.

The United Methodist Men's organization on conference and district levels become autonomous of the commission and report directly to the Annual Conference with relationships to the commissions and the conference Board of Discipleship.

The conference committee on nominations nominate an interim conference president
of United Methodist Men to serve during the organizational period, (1980-81) with the
goal of electing a president in June 1981.

4. The district committee on nominations nominate an interim district president of United Methodist Men to serve during the organizational period, (1980-81) with the goal of electing a president at the district conference in May 1981.

The conference lay leader call the conference and district United Methodist Men presidents together for an organizational meeting as soon after they have been selected as possible.

This organizational process; in so far as possible, be funded from the Conference Commission for Lay Concerns budget.

Rationale:

 The Council on Ministry of the conference and the districts are responsible for the areas of concern dealt with when the commissions were structured in 1972. This new structure will provide for the leadership development of the laity and reduce the size of the organization to make it more functional and economical.

The United Methodist Men's organization can be a viable part of the churches' ministry but needs to move out on its own. It has been a part of the board of laity and Commission for Lay Concerns for many years without success.

Report No. 2

Organization Of The Commission For Lay Concerns

Adopted 6-3-80

There shall be a Central Texas Conference Commission for Lay Concerns.

PURPOSE: The Conference Commission for Lay Concerns shall encourage and facilitate lay participation in the planning and decision making processes at all levels of the Annual Conference and serve as a forum for the interchange of ideas and information among the leadership of the church. The Commission shall foster an understanding of the role of the laity in the total ministry of the church.

RESPONSIBILITIES: The Commission shall have the following responsibilities;

 The training of certified lay speakers and the development of lay speaking programs for the conference.

The training of District Lay Leaders.

3. The support of the lay organizations of the conference. (United Methodist Youth, United Methodist Women and United Methodist Men.)

4. The representation of the concerns of all laity.

5. The development of a lay leadership bank.

The promotion and support of conference programs through the acceptance of program assignments from the Annual Conference Council on Ministries.

And such other responsibilities as may be assigned to it by the Annual Conference.

OFFICERS: The conference lay leader shall be elected for a two year term by the Annual Conference upon nomination by the conference nominating committee. An associate conference lay leader, who shall be vice-chairperson of the commission, conference director of lay speaking, a recording secretary and such other officers as the commission may authorize shall be elected for a two year term by the commission upon nomination by the nominating committee of the commission.

MEMBERSHIP: The Conference Commission for Lay Concerns shall be composed of the conference lay leader who shall chair the commission, an associate conference lay leader, conference director of lay speaking, the district lay leaders, the presiding bishop (or the representative of), a district superintendent, the conference presidents of United Methodist Youth, United Methodist Women and United Methodist Men, four (4) district presidents of each United Methodist Youth, United Methodist Women and United Methodist Men (to be selected by their respective conference organizations, in such a way so as to represent urban and rural districts), the recording secretary and such other officers as the Conference Commission for Lay Concerns shall authorize. The assistant to the bishop and an Annual Conference Council on Ministries staff representative shall also be members.

TENURE AND VACANCIES: Election of Commission for Lay Concerns officers and members shall be for two (2) years. No person shall serve more than four (4) years consecutively in the same elected office. The conference lay leader elected in 1980 shall be eligible to serve a total of six (6) years or three terms. (to facilitate leadership continuity.) Vacancies shall be filled by the Commission for Lay Concerns as they occur.

MEETINGS: The Commission for Lay Concerns shall meet annually or as often as necessary to carry on its work and shall be called into session by the conference lay leader.

the presiding bishop, or at the request of 10% of the membership.

CONFERENCE LAY LEADER: Is the elected leader of the Laity of the conference and shall function within the guidelines of paragraph 701.8 1976 Discipline. The conference lay leader shall present a report annually concerning the activities of the office and state of the laity to the Commission for Lay Concerns and the Annual Conference and be seated as a member of the Annual Conference as a voting member.

ASSOCIATE CONFERENCE LAY LEADER: Shall relate to the conference lay leader and serve as one of the commission representatives on the Conference Board of

Discipleship. The conference lay leader may designate other areas of representation on

conference boards and agencies where permissible.

CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF LAY SPEAKING: The conference director of lay speaking shall strive to become informed in the area of oral communications for the purpose of aiding district directors in establishing programs aimed at increasing the effectiveness of the witness of laity. These programs shall involve both speaking to groups and in one-to-one relationships. The director shall be guided by standards set in the Discipline (1976) Section IX paragraph 271 and 272, and shall serve as one of the commission representatives to the Conference Board of Discipleship.

STANDING COMMITTEES: There shall be a nominating committee elected by ballot at the meeting of the commission at the site of Annual Conference with five (5) receiving the highest number of votes serving. The committee shall elect its own chairperson. There shall be an executive committee composed of the commission officers, the conference presidents of United Methodist Youth, United Methodist Women, and United Methodist Men and a

cabinet representative.

The District Organization Of The Commission For Lay Concerns

There shall be in every district an organization of the laity known as the District

Commission for Lay Concerns.

PURPOSE: The District Commission for Lay Concerns shall encourage and facilitate the participation of laity in all areas of decision making and planning processes within the district and local church. The commission shall foster an understanding by the laity of its role in the total ministry of the church. The commission shall develop and implement the lay speaking program and such other responsibilities and duties as may be assigned to it by Conference Commission for Lay Concerns, the District Conference or District Council on Ministries. It shall specifically support and sponsor events for the purpose of developing a spirit of community within the district churches. The commission shall be supportive of the programs of the organized groups of laity within the district. (United Methodist Youth, United Methodist Women, and United Methodist Men.)

MEMBERSHIP: The District Commission for Lay Concerns shall be composed of the district lay leader who shall be chairperson, the associate district lay leaders (if elected), the district director of lay speaking, local church lay leaders, the district superintendent, the district president of United Methodist Women, district president of United Methodist

Men, and such others as authorized by the district commission.

OFFICERS: The district lay leader shall be elected for a two year term by the District Conference at its session immediately preceding the Annual Conference session upon nomination by the district nominating committee. The newly elected district lay leader

shall assume office at the end of the Annual Conference session.

A secretary/treasurer, district director of lay speaking, and such other directors as authorized by the district commission shall be elected annually by the district commission upon nomination by its nominating committee. There may be elected by the same process associate district lay leaders if authorized by the district commission. These elections shall occur not more than 60 days after the District Conference session immediately preceding the Annual Conference session.

TENURE AND VACANCIES: All elections of Commission for Lay Concerns members shall be for the term of two (2) years. Any vacancy occurring in the district Commission for Lay Concerns shall be filled by that Commission for Lay Concerns. No officer may serve

more than four (4) years consecutively in the same office.

STANDING COMMITTEES: A district commission nominating committee shall be elected by ballot at the first commission meeting of the calendar year. The three (3) persons receiving the greatest number of ballots shall serve. The committee shall choose its chairperson. There shall be an executive committee composed of the officers the district

presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, United Methodist Youth, and district superintendent.

MEETINGS: The commission and/or its executive committee shall meet annually or as often as necessary to carry out its duties. Meetings shall be called by the district lay leader or district superintendent.

FINANCES: The district Commission for Lay Concerns through its executive committee shall cooperate with the conference Commission for Lay Concerns to obtain funds needed to carry out its duties.

DISTRICT LAY LEADER: Is the elected leader of the laity of the district and shall function within the guidelines of paragraph 752 of the 1976 Discipline. The district lay leader shall present a report annually concerning the activities of the office and the state of the laity to the Commission for Lay Concerns and the District Conference, and shall be a member of the District Conference.

ASSOCIATE DISTRICT LAY LEADERS: (If elected) Shall relate to the district lay leader and the churches of the sub-district in a manner prescribed by the district

Commission for Lay Concerns.

DISTRICT DIRECTOR OF LAY SPEAKING: The district director of lay speaking shall strive to become informed in the area of oral communications for the purpose of training the laity of the district in these skills. The director shall establish programs which involve both speaking to groups and in one-to-one relationships. The director shall function under the guidelines of paragraph 271 and 272 of the 1976 Discipline.

This document may be changed by a simple majority of those present and voting at the regular annual meeting of the conference Commission for Lay Concerns provided that ten (10) days notice of the proposed change be given in writing to its membership in advance of

said meeting.

HOMES FOR RETIRED MINISTERS Report No. 1

Adopted 6-3-80

Your Homes for Retired Ministers has completed another year service as it has done

since 1906. We still have 30 homes with 28 of them occupied.

Each home has been acquired by the conference with the understanding that it would be kept in liveable repair. Insurance and taxes must be paid. To provide funds for these expenditures a special offering is received in the churches each year. Our special offering this year will be received in September. The special offering this year amounted to \$11,286.09 for which we are very grateful.

For the past five years the residents of the homes have been contributing monthly to our program and are taking care of all minor repairs on their residence. Their gifts this past year amounted to \$7428.38. Their support has helped tremendously. The conference may be

interested to know that the following amounts were spent for:

Insurance \$2758.00 Repairs

COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION AND MINISTRY Report No. 1

1. To develop an instrument for evaluation for campus ministry, in consultation with our campus ministers, and use to measure and monitor campus ministries in the Central Texas Conference, leading to an interpretation of that work to the Annual Conference.

 To review local campus ministry budgets, recommending apportionment request to CF&A; to determine local campus ministry budgets in keeping with such allocation of Central Texas Conference funds.

3. To express appreciation to local churches for their financial undergirding of campus ministry within the Central Texas Conference by (1) letter (2) news reports and (3) supplying speakers and/or films of their work.

4. To accomplish the above goals, the Commission requests an apportionment of \$113,714 for Campus Ministry and \$183,573.00 for T.M.C.A., and apportioned to the districts on the decimal.

5. To continue to act as a liaison between the local church and institutions of higher education including (1) support for the Black College fund (2) enhancing Student

Recognition Day (3) the welfare of the two Methodist Colleges in our Conference.

6. To request Research and Planning Committee to study and assign to the proper group ways to relate to those chaplains within the bounds of our Conference, and those who are members of our Conference but serve elsewhere that they may feel more support.

- 5. The Kate Warnick awards for outstanding histories written in 1979 of local churches in the state of Texas went to the following: Large church (over 400 members), Los Angelos Heights United Methodist Church, San Antonio. Small church: First United Methodist Church, Cedar Hill.
- 6. Applications for membership in the Texas Methodist Historical Society are available at the Archives and History display. The Society meets annually on Thursday and Friday following Ministers' Week at SMU.

CENTRAL TEXAS CONFERENCE FEDERAL CREDIT UNION

The Conference Credit Union is alive and doing well. While the inflation seems to have been adversely affecting the Credit Union for some time, we feel that now the Credit Union position is beginning to strengthen. We still offer the benefits of automatic loan insurance without charge, and automatic life insurance on share deposits up to \$2,000. All deposits are insured for the maximum accorded by Federal law.

Our current assets are \$612,623. Our loans are \$552,440. Since the Credit Union was organized we have had to charge off only \$7,255 in loan losses and we still hope to recover some of that. We currently have 700 members and continue to show membership growth.

We urge each eligible person to seriously consider paying the \$5.25 membership fee and begin a systematic savings program. We pay the best rate of interest available for this type of account. We also have a Share Certificate available at 1/4% above the current rate paid by

the Savings and Loan Companies. As the Money-Market sales continue to come down, we encourage you to look to your Credit Union as an investing place.

We also serve our members with one of the best rates of interest available anywhere on

secured or signature loans.

We commend our Executive Secretary, Dr. J. W. SPRINKLE, for the fine work he has done. He will be continuing in this capacity with the Credit Union.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION Report No. 1

Approved 6-4-80

 The members of the Council on Finance and Administration once again thank the leaders and the members of the Conference for maintaining the standard of meeting all our obligations 100% in 1979. This year we are presenting for your approval a budget

that represents a challenge for the new quadrennium.

2. The Salary allowances for the District Superintendency shall be an amount equal to 110% of the average of the salary and allowances paid to pastors of the top twenty (20) churches of the Conference. It shall be computed on the basis of salaries approved by Charge Conference which appear on the Episcopal work sheets as of April 1 prior to the meeting of the Annual Conference. The figures will be compiled by the Director of Professional Services and transmitted to the Chairman of the Council on Finance and Administration and the Conference Secretary-Treasurer within five days.

The salary includes a travel allowance of \$3,600.00, a housing allowance of \$2,000.00. The money requested by the General Bd. of Pensions for all ministers under

appointment with annuity is added to the above figure.

Other conference offices with a Dist. Supt. status are set in the same manner. However the Director of Church Growth and Development is to have for the first year a travel allowance that is to be paid on voucher at the mileage rate set by the Conference.

The Council recommends to the Annual Conference that district committees on finance be authorized to draw up district budgets for presentation to the District Stewards for office operations and to travel allowances, provided the budgets will be submitted to the Council on Finance and Administration for approval if the total

increase of the district fund exceeds 10% of the previous year's budget.

We recommend that District Stewards be authorized to apportion a Connectional Contingency Fund used in paying in full apportionment items which may fall short within the respective district. The apportionments will not include the traditional cushions. The Connectional Contingency Fund will be administered at the district level in the same means as the District Work Fund. It is understood that if a portion of the Connectional Contingency Fund is not used in any given year, it will remain in the fund and future apportionments will be reduced. Any adjustments for unusual local church situations will be made in the apportionment of the Connectional Contingency Fund only. All other apportionments will be distributed to every local church on the basis of the decimal.

We recommend the unified form agreed upon by the Cabinet for reporting district

budgets.

In 1981 the Conference Claimants Fund is to be set at \$640,000.00. This covers all costs and expenses for the support of all obligations to the Retired Ministers, their wives and dependent children.

In 1981 the Connectional Ministers Fund will be \$273,141.00. Of that amount, the

Episcopal Fund is \$54,496.00, and the District Superintendents Fund will be \$218,600.00.

4. The Council recommends the request from the Board of Higher Education and Ministry that the Texas Methodist College Association apportionment remain at \$1.50 per member. The Council recommends the Wesley Foundation Fund remain 93¢ per member. These funds to be apportioned to districts and local churches on the decimal authorized by the conference.

5. The Council on Finance and Administration requests the following for 1981:

1. Conference Insurance Program	\$190,000
2. Texas Methodist College Association	183,573
3. Wesley Foundation	113,714
4. Ministerial Education Fund	150,308
5. Black Methodist Colleges	73,658
6. Missional Priority	57,366

We recommend that the Equitable Salary Fund be drawn from monies deposited with the Texas Methodist Foundation.

7. We recommend that the funds distributed to the Board of Global Ministries from the Central Texas Foundation be retained in the Foundation in order to build up the corpus. The amount of \$29,000 will be placed in the Board's budget by the Conference.

 We recommend that a \$20,000 figure be placed in the budget of the Board of Discipleship Camp Committee for Glen Lake Camp. We encourage every local church to emphasize

the Glen Lake Special Offering in March.

 We encourage the support of the Advance Specials Program in every local church. Especially, we ask consideration for the goal of \$62,200.00 annually for Ethnic Minority Local Church and \$33,600.00 for the World Hunger Program.

10. We recommend the appointment of Dr. Wm. Greenwaldt as Secretary-Treasurer of the

Central Texas Conference.

- While no special day is designated for an offering for the Texas Alcohol-Narcotics Education, Inc., we approve this special cause for either an appropriation from the budget in the local church, or a special offering taken at such time as the local church determines.
- In keeping with the requirements of the Discipline, the apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences will be combined into one fund, namely, World

Service and Conference Benevolences. This fund, along with Connectional Ministry, Conference Claimant's Fund, Conference Projects, Minister's Insurance, Texas Methodist College Association, Wesley Foundation, Ministerial Education Fund, Black Methodist College Fund, Missional Priority Fund, Commission on Church Growth and Development, Lydia Patterson, Southern Methodist University, will be apportioned to the Districts on the decimal figure, established annually, as authorized in the Standing Rules of the Conference.

4. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to distribute each month the receipts from local churches for World Service and Conference Benevolences among the funds included in the annual budget of the conference in proportion to their apportionments. Any deficit in remittances from the churches will be covered by payments from the Operating

Reserve, upon approval by CFA.

5. All boards, commissions and other agencies shall have prepared in writing their detailed budget requests for the ensuing fiscal year by a date mutually agreed upon and announced by CFA and ACCOM. The program agencies shall present their requests to the Committee on Coordination and Budget by said date. The non-program agencies shall present their requests to the CFA by the same date. One copy of all budgets must be sent to the CFA Chairperson, Treasurer and Council Director. Requests will not be considered if received past the due date unless time extension has been requested.

6. No board or agency of the Central Texas Conference shall expend any money for any purpose which has not been included in the original budget, as amended and approved by CFA and the Conference and printed in the current Journal. Exceptions to this rule

can only be made by CFA or its executive committee.

7. The fiscal year of all boards, commissions and other agencies operating through the Central Treasury shall begin January 1 and close on December 31.

8. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to pay from the Operating Reserve the following items:

a. Expenses of printing the Journal, which may exceed budget appropriation.

b. Expenses of the Conference Secretarial Staff.

c. Expense of Fidelity Bonds for the Conference Treasurer and others who handle

Conference Funds, as determined by CFA.

d. Expenses of auditing the books of the Conference Treasurer, the treasurers of Boards, commissions and other agencies of the Conference as may be ordered by CFA. Such audits are to be made by the Conference auditors, the firm of Wilson and Plenson, C.P.A.

e. The moving expense of ministers of the Conference as described in the 1973 minutes of the Conference Journal, Page 129. When the next Annual Budget is prepared the CFA is authorized to place the total amount in the budget to repay the Operating

Reserve for past year spending.

f. Other expenditures as may be authorized by CFA. Such expenditures not to exceed \$500 may be authorized by the Executive Committee of the Council.

9. The Conference Treasurer is authorized:

a. To consolidate the various funds of the Annual Conference and of the agencies into

one or more bank accounts.

b. Fo write all checks for the agencies of the Conference upon requisition by authorized officers of the agency and in keeping with the approved Conference Budget. He is also authorized to transmit to the authorized treasurers all other funds that are raised by the local churches in response to General, Jurisdictional and Annual Conference askings that have been approved by the appropriate body.

c. The Conference Treasurer, after the close of the fiscal year, shall transfer from the accounts of all boards, commissions and other agencies of the Conference into the Operating Reserve all unexpended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just closed (excepting only items specifically exempt by CFA) making allowances for all outstanding checks. This procedure is recommended with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer will honor the requisitions for all

necessary expenses of the new fiscal year within the limits of the appropriations.

d. To invest the funds of the conference in Government Securities and Federally insured depositories up to and not exceeding insurability, and to borrow on and dispose of investments at or, prior to, maturity, and to deposit the proceeds from these investments in accounts of the Conference at his discretion and under the guidance of CFA.

e. To deposit funds for specifically designated purposes in federally insured depositories under the joint control of the Central Treasury and the agency concerned, with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on Finance and

Administration.

Oran Stephens

Oran Stephens was born July 1, 1901 in Erath County, Texas. He was married to Ora Mae Moss November 24, 1921, and to them one son, Bill, was born. Ora Mae died August 28, 1976.

Oran was engaged in Banking at Waxahachie, Texas when he obeyed God's Call into Christian Ministry. Educated in Trinity University, Waxahachie, he was honored with a Doctor of Divinity degree from Texas Wesleyan College, Fort Worth. He was first admitted to the Central Texas Conference On Trial in 1927, was ordained Deacon in 1929 and Elder in 1931. Because of poor health he retired in 1960 after a distinguished Ministry in the following appointments: Waxahachie Circuit, Eddy, Red Oak, Italy, Midlothian, 1st Cleburne, 1st Georgetown, Arlington Heights and Central (Overton Park) Fort Worth and District Superintendent of the Cisco, Waco and Gatesville districts.

Oran Stephens was a genuine man — a redeemed man — God's man — a human being — who by impeccable integrity, indefatigable energy, resolute purpose, unceasing work, unending endurance, indomitable courage and dynamic leadership gave service to God, The Church and human beings which was rich, fruitful, deep, abiding. He and Ora Mae will continue to serve through the Oran and Ora Mae Stephens Scholarship Fund for worthy lay and clergy students at Southern Methodist University, Dallas.

After retirement in 1960, Oran and Ora Mae moved to Dallas and were devoted disciples in the Oak Cliff United Methodist Church as long as health permitted. Following a long illness, he entered The Church Triumphant on July 12, 1979. A Memorial Service was held at Boze-Mitchell Chapel, Waxahachie by his pastor, Marvin C. Bledsoe, Carl P. Mehaffy, Jr. and Maggart B. Howell. Burial was in City Cemetery, Waxahachie.

Joseph Isham Patterson

Joseph Isham Patterson was born on February 2, 1894 in Nettleton, Lee County, Mississippi. He was the first son of Mary Frances

Redwine and Columbus Washington Patterson.

"Joseph," was about twelve years old when his family came to Texas, and he was educated in the DeLeon Public Schools where he was graduated from high school in 1911. He was a good student and showed a particular aptitude for mathematics, but it was necessary for him to work to assist his family. Upon the untimely death of his father at age 52 in the 1915 Flu Epidemic, he secured a job teaching high school in Rising Star, Texas. After two years of teaching, he entered Old Polytechnic College in Fort Worth and later transferred to



SMU where he studied until he joined the Air Corps of the Armed Services in November.

In 1918 when the armistice was signed, he was in the Field Artillery Officers Training School, and he was discharged one month later. After his discharge he returned to SMU where he graduated in 1922 with a B.A. Degree and a Bachelor of Divinity Degree from the Theology School. While at SMU he was a good student and participated in student activities including athletics. He was a three-year letterman on the Mustang Football Team.

In 1923 he received a Master's Degree in Religious Education from Columbia University

in New York.

In 1926 he received a Master's Degree in Sociology from the University of Virginia. While there he met his wife-to-be, Caroline Anderson White, of Anchorage Farm, Albermarle County, Virginia. He was serving as Pastor to several rural churches and attending the University of Virginia when they met. They were married at her home in 1926 and immediately returned to Texas where he began his active ministry in the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church.

During his 40 years of active ministry in the Central Texas Conference, he served as Pastor in Corsicana, Bynum, Maypearl, Santa Anna, Stephenville, Hillsboro, Cisco, Fort Worth Meadowbrook, Graham, Mexia, Olney, Seventh Street, Temple, and finally Fort Worth Boulevard.

He retired from the active ministry in 1963, and he and his wife moved to Fort Worth Meadowbrook Area where he became Minister of Visitation at Meadowbrook Methodist

Church. He served in this capacity until approximately two years before his death.

On August 4, 1979, while at home, he fell and thereafter developed pneumonia, necessitating his being hospitalized, first at Harris Hospital-Methodist in Fort Worth and then subsequently the Veterans Administration Hospital in Dallas. He died on Sunday morning, September 9, 1979 just three days after he had become a resident of the C. C. Young Memorial Home, a Methodist facility, in Dallas. He was 85 years old.

He is survived by his wife of 53 years and three sons, Joseph Redwine Patterson, of Dallas; James White Patterson, of Austin; and Julian Culver Patterson of Temple. He is also survived by seven grandchildren, two sisters, Mrs. W. C. Bagwell and Mrs. Russell

Rice, both of DeLeon, and by eleven nieces and nephews.

In the vigor of his youth, he was six feet tall and weighted approximately 175 lbs. He was an active person all his life and enjoyed his work as a Methodist Minister. He was fortunate in knowing from an early age that he wanted to be a Methodist Preacher, and he fulfilled this ambition throughout all his adult life.

He was a dedicated Christian who believed in the integrity of the Methodist Church and its service to people. He tried very hard to practice what he tried very hard to preach and that was integrity.

He and his wife never met a stranger and called everyone a friend.

In a sentence summation of his life, it can be said HE WAS A GOOD MAN!

Memorial services were conducted at the Meadowbrook United Methodist Church on September 11 at 10:30 a.m. Reverend Bob F. Weathers, Dr. T. Morgan Garrett and Reverend Hubert L. Austin were the officiating ministers. Services were also conducted at 2:00 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church in DeLeon, Texas with Reverend Bob F. Weathers and the Reverend Charles McClure officiating. Interment followed in the DeLeon Cemetery.

The words of Wesley are so appropriate for Brother Joe, "Servant of God well done. Thy glorious warfares past, the battles fought, the race is run, and thou art crowned at last."

Dr. Raybon W. Porter

Dr. Raybon Wilson Porter, 80, a pioneer in recreational and educational programs in the Methodist Church, died Sunday in a hospital.

Porter, who graduated from SMU in 1922, was one of the first

Methodist ministers to serve as a minister of youth and education. He was affiliated with churches in Wichita, Kan., Tulsa, Oklahoma City, Shreveport and Wichita Falls.

He also was minister of education at the First United Methodist Church from 1958 to 1966 and was associated with Ridglea Methodist, Edgepark Methodist, Wedgwood Methodist, River Oaks Methodist and First Methodist in Hurst before retiring in 1975.



Porter, a native of English, Texas, was the son of a Methodist minister. He did graduate work at Northwestern University and was awarded an honorary doctorate of humanities from Midwestern University in 1954 while serving at the First Methodist Church in Wichita Falls.

He was president of the National Christian Educators, Conference Christian Educators. Surviving are his wife, Zona; three daughters, Mrs. P. W. Woodruff Jr. of Wichita Falls

and Mrs. Ray Marie Fowler and Mrs. Michael W. Brandon of Fort Worth; two brothers, Cecil Porter of Dallas and Paul C. Porter of Lewisville; two sisters, Mrs. Janette Weaver of Richardson and Miss Alyene Porter of Dallas, and four grandchildren.

William C. Crawford

William C. Crawford was born January 23, 1921, in Oak Wood, Texas. He grew up and attended schools in Breckenridge and Rising Star. In 1942 he entered into his country's military service as a member of the Army Air Force, to serve until his Honorable Discharge in 1945. In 1943 he was married to Genevieve Hammonds and, after his military discharge, they returned to Rising Star where they made their home. Mills.

He also served on several Annual Conference Agencies including the statistical staff.

The Reverend Standlee was a life member of the Masonic Lodge.

Following retirement the Standlees lived in Fort Worth and Reverend Standlee served as Associate Pastor of the Arlington Heights Church and taught a Sunday School Class there for 17 years. When his health began to fail they moved to their son's home in Burleson for a short while and then to the Wesleyan Retirement Home in Georgetown in January, 1979.

Death came in Fort Worth, February 2, 1980. The Memorial Service was held on February 4 at the Arlington Heights United Methodist Church with Reverend Henry Radde, Dr. James Campbell and Dr. Sidney Roberts leading. Burial was in Wilson Valley Cemetery near Little River.

Survivors include his wife, Beulah; a son, M. Walter William Ward

Walter William Ward was born June 7, 1887 in the Vaughn Community near Hillsboro, Texas. He married Miss Ruby Henrichsen. Into his family, two children were born, Elizabeth Ann, now Mrs. Elizabeth Ann Curry, of Atlanta, Georgia, and Eugene Spooner Ward of Dallas, Texas.

He received his B.A. Degree from Southwestern University and his B. D. Degree from S.M.U. He was awarded two honorary doctorate degrees, a Doctor of Divinity Degree given in 1935 by Southwestern University and a Doctor of Law Degree from T.C.U. in 1969.

Dr. Ward loved the Methodist Church which in turn honored in almost every possible way except that of electing him to office of Bishop. He was elected a delegate to the General Conference of the Methodist Church in the years 1934 and 1938, and to the Uniting Conference in 1939 and 1944. He was elected a delegate to the Jurisdictional Conferences of 1938, 1940 and 1944. He served as District Superintendent of the Waco District for 4 years and of the Ft. Worth District for 6 years. In his 20 years of ministry, Rev. Ward had gained an enviable reputation as a church builder. At Lorena, he built a church education building; at Ferris, a church; at Arlington Heights in Ft. Worth, a building which was used as the sanctuary for 22 years, and at Gatesville, an education building and a remodeled auditorium. His business ability was recognized by S.M.U. when he was elected a trustee of that institution, a position he ably held for 27 years.

In 1950, Dr. Ward recalls, "a rich experience in my life" occurred when the Bishop appointed him Harris Hospital Chaplain and Commissioner. For 23 years, Dr. Ward's name was synonymous with that of Harris Hospital in Ft. Worth. He very capably served the hospital for 9 years as Chaplain and Commissioner. As Chaplain of Harris Hospital, Dr. Ward accomplished many goals, one of them being that he was instrumental in raising all the money necessary to build the new nurses dormitory for the hospital. Not wanting to lose such a wonderful leader, the hospital appointed Dr. Ward as Director of Public Relations in 1959. He retained that post for one year until the hospital employed him for yet another position, that of trustee to raise money to help in the education of student nurses. In this capacity, he served for 13 years, resigning in 1973, at the age of 86 years. During that 13 year period, Dr. Ward led in raising enough money to fully finance 648 student nurses and, in addition, left an endowment fund of more than \$375,000 for the same purpose, a fact of which he was very proud. For this achievement, Dr. Ward was honored by the hospital board of trustees by their naming this fund the "W. W. Ward Endowment Fund of Harris Hospital."

Dr. Ward is best described by the words of commendation from T.C.U. when he was given a Doctor of Law Degree.

"He is a servant of God and man, one who has responded to every call, achieved in every opportunity, enlarged the service of every task, and

whose concept of Christian ministry is to work while strength still comes and to praise while breath still is given."

Those who knew Dr. Ward would join me in saying, "There was a man sent from God whose name was Walter."

Rev. Shelly A. Keese

Shelley Alexander Keese was born of Methodist parents in Waco, Texas, September 7, 1907. His father was Crawford Keese, his mother was Lucille Keese. His father and mother were devoted Methodists and taught their children to live respectfully and to defend the Methodist Church. Bro. Shelly joined Jones Chapel M. E. Church in Waco, Texas, on profession of faith and transferred to St. James M. E. Church, Waco, Texas. He was called to preach while attending high school. He became an exorter in the St. James M. E. Church. He was licensed as a local preacher by the Waco District, West Texas Conference of the M. E. Church. His first appointment was Joyce Chapel M. E. Church in Cameron, Texas. He was appointed to this



small congregation in 1926. In 1929 he married a young lady, whom he had known during their childhood days. Her mother, by adoption was a life-long Methodist, a member of St. James M. E. Church of Waco, Texas, and a dear friend of the Keese family. His wife, Algie was taught early in her life the greatness of the Methodist Church; her love for the Methodist Church is without measure. Rev. Keese and his wife Algie have made wonderful contributions to the on-going program of the Methodist during their forty-four years in the active ministry. During the active ministry of Bro. Keese many churches were built personally by Bro. Keese and many were under his supervision. Bro. Keese served as District Superintendent of the Waco District for six years. He served as Chairman of the Committee of Finance of the West Texas Conference of the Methodist Church for twelve years. Bro. Keese retired from active ministry in 1973. He departed this life Tuesday, April 22, 1980, in a local hospital.

He leaves to mourn his passing his wife; one Brother, Ocie B. Keese, of Tucson, Arizona; three Nephews, Archie, George, and Charles Darden, all of California; one God Child, Lil Miss Verona Johnson and many other relatives and church members and friends.

Nancy Dais Todd Murray

Nancy Murray, the second woman to be ordained elder in the Central Texas Conference, died April 22, 1980 after a three-year battle with Hodgkins Disease. She was 32.

She was born in Chicago, a 1965 graduate of Milby High School in Houston, and graduated in 1970 from Stephen F. Austin State University with a bachelor of science degree. Nancy then taught in the public schools for several years. She graduated from the Perkins School of Theology at SMU in 1978, having served in 1975 and 1976 as pastor of the Cresson United Methodist Church. She served as pastor of the Kennedale United Methodist Church after graduation from seminary.



Nancy felt called to ministry early in her life, but did not realize her goal until later. She was well-known for her contributions to the United Methodist Women and to the cause of freedom for all people. Her enthusiasm and joy radiated to those who knew her. Devoted as a wife, mother, minister, and friend, she had an unusual capacity to communicate love, to care and to listen creatively.

Survivors are her husband, the Rev. H. Doyle Murray III, campus minister of the University of Texas at Arlington; a daughter, Natalie Dais Murray, age 3; parents, Mr. and

Mrs. Edward W. Todd of Houston; a sister, Genie Todd of Houston; and a brother, Dr. David

P. Todd of Lexington, Kentucky.

Funeral services were held at the Arlington Heights United Methodist Church in Fort Worth. The sermon was given by Grady Hardin; the eulogy by DeForrest Wiksten. Ed Otwell, Martha Gilmore and Barbara Gaugl also shared leadership in the service. Burial was at the Cresson Cemetery in Cresson. The Nancy Todd Murray Endowed Scholarship Fund has been established at the Perkins School of Theology in her honor to continue the work she loved.

Franklin Taylor Fisher

Franklin Taylor Fisher was born on April 24, 1892 in Williamson County, Texas. He married the former Myrtle Mae McClenahan on August 14, 1910 in Comanche, Texas. The Rev. J. L. Glaze


The Rev. J. L. Glaze, 65, of 430 Bales Street, Cleburne, Texas, died May 27, 1980.

He said, "I was reared a country boy and thought I would always be a country preacher." However, God had other places for Brother Hopkins to serve His people. He was pastor in Brenham, Itasca, Rosenburg, Sealy, Dallas, Houston, New Orleans, Waco, and Fort Worth. He retired from the active ministry in 1957. His ministry did not end however. She could be considered an American version of Mother Teresa, for she dedicated her life to helping the poor. A Methodist missionary for more than 50 years, she was known as "Miss Elma."

Funeral services were held Jan. 3, 1980, for Elma Morgan, 92, at the First United Methodist Church in Arlington.

Miss Elma, of 403 S. Mesquite in Arlington, died on New Year's Day at Arlington Memorial Hospital after an intestinal illness.

Her work included organizing day-care centers and prenatal training for expectant mothers in the 1920s, long before such programs were common in America.

Her efforts through the years brought her recognition as the outstanding senior citizen in

Arlington for 1971.

Like Mother Teresa, Miss Elma had little desire for worldly goods and contributed much of her own money to her missionary work. She once told Dr. Jack Payne, her pastor for the last 13 years, "Every time I give a dollar away, I get a dollar from God in return."

A native of Stephens, Ark., Miss Elma received her bachelor's degree from the University of Arkansas and then completed her master's degree in religious education at Scarritt

College in Nashville, Tenn.

After completing her education, she worked as a missionary in Brazil from 1915 to 1920. She returned to Brazil in 1921, but was forced to return to the United States because of ill health. After a short period of convalescence, she was assigned to national missions.

Miss Elma's specialty was organizing new missions. Her work took her to Oklahoma City,

Tampa, Fla., San Antonio, San Marcos, Texas, Houston and Dallas.

She first came to Dallas in the 1920s and helped set up the Wesley House in the "Little Mexico" section of West Dallas. At the house, she arranged free dental care for girls who could not afford such treatment, taught household skills, and provided vocational training for boys.

Officially she retired in 1952, but "She never stopped being a missionary." She is not survived by any immediate family, but, "Everyone was her family."

XI. General Section Conference Standing Rules

As Amended June 7, 1978

I. ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Conference Procedure:

The Central Texas Conference shall be organized according to the Book of Discipline (Para. 36 and Para. 67: Amendment VII) and shall meet annually at the time appointed by the bishop (Para. 661.2) and the place chosen by the conference (Para. 661.3).

1.1 Adjourned or special sessions shall be called in the manner set forth in the Book of Discipline

(Para. 661.4).

1.2 The business of the Annual Conference shall be conducted according to Roberts Rules of Order.

1.3 Lay members and alternate members of the Annual Conference shall be elected at the charge conference for a one year term to begin on January 1, following their election, subject, however, to

paragraph 700.3 of the Discipline.

1.3.1 To equalize the number of Lay and Clerical members of the Annual Conference the following will be members by virtue of the office held: each District Lay Leader, each District United Methodist Women's President and Conference Program Board Chairperson who is a lay person, the Diaconal Ministers of the Conference not otherwise members, and Jurisdictional Council on Ministries, General Council on Ministries and General Church Board and Agency representatives not otherwise members of Annual Conference; and one additional Lay member from the Charges of the Conference whose membership is above the number, set annually by the Conference Secretary required to equalize the ratio between clergy and Lay Members. This figure will be revised annually. The Conference Secretary will notify the District Superintendent as to the churches that will elect additional members by January preceding the next Annual Conference.

1.3.2 Each charge of the Annual Conference is responsible for defraying the expenses of its lay and clerical members while in attendance at the conference.

.4 All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference which pertain to the work of one of the

An matters to be presented to the Annual Conference which pertain to the work of one of the conference boards, commissions, committees, and councils shall be referred to the proper boards, commissions, committees, or councils before action can be taken by the Annual Conference, and shall be reported back to the conference for action prior to the close of the conference session, unless otherwise directed by the Annual Conference.

1.5 All papers, resolutions, obituaries, and reports coming to the conference, not included in the Pending Report book, must be typewritten in triplicate and two copies of said report must be in the hands of the secretary before they are presented to the conference. Any reports requiring approval of the Annual Conference, not in the Pending Report book, shall be reproduced for members of the conference so that they may follow the report as it is being presented.

6 Per diem allowance for each day in actual attendance at Annual Conference will be granted retired ministers, retired deaconesses, and pastors, any of whom are receiving a total salary of, or less than the minimum salary of the conference. It shall also be granted to the aforementioned

ministers' spouses and students appointed to attend school.

1.7 There shall be a Committee on Memoirs composed of the secretary of the conference and the secretary of the Board of Pensions to insure suitable memoirs of the deceased ministers and wives or widows of ministers. The ministers in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing it with the committee immediately after the funeral.

1.8 Any of the standing rules may be amended or suspended by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at a session of Annual Conference, provided that any motion to amend the Conference Standing Rules must lay on table at least one day before the conference can vote to amend.

1.9 Vacancies on all Conference Boards, Councils, Commissions and Committees shall be filled by nominations by and selected by the appropriate body. Those persons elected to fill vacancies shall serve the remainder of the tenure of the original member. "However, when the chairperson of the committee has been transferred to another district and, in the opinion of the appropriate body, unusual circumstances require the continued services of such chairpersons, the body shall have the right to retain that person in its membership for the remainder of that person's tenure. Such persons shall not be counted as district representatives."

- 1.9.1 Any member of the Conference Boards, Councils, Commissions, and Committees who is absent without excuse from any two consecutive meetings of the Board, Council, Commission, or Committee shall thereby forfeit membership on the agency and their vacancy shall be filled in accordance with 1.9 above.
- 1.9.2 Retirement from the active itineracy shall vacate a minister's membership on any Conference Board, Council, Commission, Committee, and Institutional Boards, effective on the date such relationship is taken.
- 1.10 Members of General Boards, Councils, Commissions or Committees within the Annual Conference shall be exofficio members of corresponding Conference Agencies.

II. CONFERENCE ORGANIZATION

Annual Conference Council on Ministries:

 There shall be an Annual Conference Council on Ministries as recommended in the Book of Discipline (Para, 831).

1.1 The purpose of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries shall be: (a) to receive program recommendations from the local churches, the district agencies, the annual conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Councils on Ministries; (b) to develop these recommendations into a coordinated program to be recommended to the Annual Conference for consideration, amendment, and adoption as the Annual Conference program; and (c) to provide implementation for an administration of the coordinated program as adopted by the conference.

- 1.2 The Conference Council on Ministries shall be composed of the presiding bishop; a chairperson; vice-chairperson; secretary; and treasurer; the district superintendents; the president of the United Methodist Women and one additional representative from the United Methodist Women; the conference lay leader, the conference director-president of the United Methodist Men; two youth representatives, two young adults, and two representatives of United Methodist Men; the Chairperson of the Board of Discipleship, Board of Church and Society, and Board of Global Ministries, the Board of Higher Education and Ministry, the Commission on Religion and Race; and the Commission on Status and Role of Women in the Church, the Chairpersons of the Committees of the ACCOM, three district representatives from each district, one clergy, one lay woman and one lay man, divided into three classes, one of which shall be elected each year for a three year term; members of the General Council on Ministry; Jurisdictional Council on Ministry, and General Church board and Agency representatives not otherwise members of the Council, and additional members at large as needed to assure minority representatives and equal lay and clerical membership.
- 1.2.1 The conference council staff, the conference secretary-treasurer, conference statistician, the assistant to the bishop, and a representative from the Council on Finance and Administration shall be members of the Council without vote. District representatives and at large members shall be elected annually and shall serve no more than four consecutive years.
- 1.3 The officers of the Council shall be a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, a secretary and a treasurer, nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Council for a two-year term. If the chairperson is a lay person, the vice-chairperson shall be a minister, and vice versa. No officer is eligible for re-election to the same office.
- 1.4 There shall be an executive committee of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries, consisting of the officers, the bishop, a district superintendent chosen by the cabinet, the conference lay leader, the president of the United Methodist Women, the Conference representation on The General Council on Ministries, and the Conference Council director who shall serve without vote. The Chairpersons of program boards and committees on co-ordination and budget, communication and interpretation, and research and planning shall also be members of the Executive Committee in consideration of all agenda matters except matters of personnel. The Council shall nominate and elect such additional members from the Council as may be required so that the executive committee is composed of one-half lay persons and one-half clergy. The officers of the Conference Council on Ministries shall fill the same office on the executive committee.
- 1.5 The executive committee of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries shall: (a) receive reports and recommendations from the conference boards and agencies to the Conference Council on Ministries; (b) serve as the personnel and budget committee for the Conference Council on Ministries and its staff; and (c) propose the agenda for the meetings of the Council.

Conference Council on Ministries (ACCOM) Committees:

 There shall be the following Council (ACCOM) committees: a Committee on Research and Planning; a Committee on Coordination and Budget; a Committee on Nominations; a Committee on Communications and Interpretation. The Council (ACCOM) shall appoint such other committees, task forces, and consultants as it deems necessary in the performance of its duties,

provided that the appointed members shall serve no more than four consecutive years.

2.1 The (ACCOM) Committee on Research and Planning shall (1) engage in planning and research on behalf of the council in the continuing ministry of The United Methodist Church within the conference; (2) serve as an advisory group in planning and research for the Annual Conference and its agencies; (3) serve as the clearinghouse for all planning and research projects under the sponsorship of the Annual Conference and its agencies; (4) relate to and cooperate with the planning and research projects of the General Council on Ministries.

2.1.1 The members of the committee shall be, the chairperson of the four Boards, the Conference Lay Leader or his representative from the United Methodist Laity (same person through the year), the president of the United Methodist Women or her representative from the United Methodist Women (same person through the year), a District Superintendent chosen by the Cabinet, the chairperson of the Commission on Religion and Race or chairperson's representative (same person through the year), chairperson of the Commission on Status and Role of Women in the Church. Members without vote: chairperson or chairperson's representative from the Conference Council on Finance and Administration (same person through the year), the Conference Council Director.

2.1.2 The officers, a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and a secretary, and such additional persons as

needed shall be nominated and elected by the Conference Council on Ministries.

2.2 The (ACCOM) Committee on Coordination and Budget shall (a) receive program recommendations from the local churches, the District and Annual Conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Councils on Ministries; (b) evaluate these recommendations and propose a coordinated conference program to the Conference Council on Ministries. It shall also study and coordinate the budget askings of the conference agencies as they relate to the conference program and make recommendations regarding the same to the Conference Council on Ministries.

2.2.1 Members shall be chairperson, a vice-chairperson, a secretary and eight members nominated and elected by the ACCOM. The membership shall be one-half clergy and one-half laity. The

Conference Council Director shall be a member without vote.

2.3 The (ACCOM) Committee on Communications and Interpretation shall (a) recommend policies that will enable the Conference, the District, and the local churches, and their agencies, to make use of all communications help; (b) make available to the Conference specialized communications resources, especially in the fields of broadcasting and audio-visuals; (c) to promote principles of good communication within the conference to provide two-way channels of communication between Annual Conference agencies, district Councils on Ministries and local churches, and to lead the Conference in making creative use of communications and opportunities offered by modern media, including Conference and general church periodicals and resources; (d) to provide communications training opportunities for leaders in the Annual Conferences and local churches; (e) to interpret the programs of the General Church and the Annual Conference to the local churches and to promote all general and conference benevolent causes in cooperation with United Methodist Communications.

2.3.1 Members shall be a chairperson, a vice-chairperson and a secretary; the District Communication Co-ordinators, and eight additional members at large. The Conference Council Director shall be a

member without vote.

2.4 The (ACCOM) Committee on Nominations shall make nominations as the Council on Ministries may determine necessary for fulfilling its program requirements. The ACCOM shall elect three clergy and three lay persons by ballot without nominations. The Committee shall elect officers from within its membership.

Conference Agencies:

Program Boards

 There shall be four Conference Program Boards within the Annual Conference Council on Ministries: The Board of Discipleship; the Board of Church and Society; the Board of Global

Ministries; and the Board of Higher Education and Ministry.

2. Each Board shall be composed of the officers, one lay man, one lay woman, one clergy representative from each district divided into three classes, one of which shall be elected each year for a three year term by the District Conference, a district superintendent chosen by the cabinet, and no more than five members at large who shall be nominated and elected by the board as it may determine necessary to assure minority representation. The district representatives and at large members shall serve no more than three consecutive years.

2.1 The initial elected body shall be divided into two classes, with one class of the initial membership serving for two years and the other half receiving the full four years. Thereafter one-half of the members shall be elected every two years for a full four year term. Members shall not serve more than four consecutive years and shall not be eligible to serve on any other program board for a one year period.

2.2 The Conference Council Director shall be a member of each board without vote.

2.3 Each board shall have a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and a secretary who shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference for a two-year period. If the chairperson is a lay person, the vice-chairperson shall be a minister, and vice versa. Officers of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election to the same office and shall not be counted as district representatives.

3. The following Boards shall have additional members:

3.1 The Board of Discipleship: the conference lay leader and two additional representatives from the United Methodist Commission for Lay Concerns; and the Mission Coordinator of Christian Personhood of the United Methodist Women.

3.2 The Board of Church and Society: the Mission Coordinator of Christian Social Involvement of the

United Methodist Women.

3.3 The Board of Global Ministries: the president of the United Methodist Women; the Mission Coordinator of Global Concern of the United Methodist Women; and one additional representative from the United Methodist Women.

3.4 The Board of Higher Education and Ministry: the chairperson, the registrar, and one other representative from the Board of the Ordained Ministry; the chairperson and one other member of the Board of Pensions; and the Mission Coordinator of Supportive Community of the United

Methodist Women.

4. The Conference Boards will provide consultative service and resources to the local churches, the District Council on Ministries, the Annual Conference, and the Annual Conference Council on Ministries. Each Board will be responsible for the essential function of the area of concern assigned to it and will be related to the objectives and scope of work set forth for its general board in the Book of Discipline.

Board of Pensions

5. The Board of Pensions shall be elected, organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (Para. 1260). A cabinet representative shall be selected by the cabinet as an additional member. The Board shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of Higher Education and Ministry and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.

5.1 The first elected body shall be divided into two classes. One class serving for the remainder of the quadrennium and the other class shall be eligible to serve for the remainder of the quadrennium and for an additional quadrennium. Thereafter, each quadrennium, new members shall be

elected for an eight year term.

Board of Ordained Ministry

 The Board of the Ministry shall be elected, organized, and function according to the Book of Discipline (Para. 665.4-665.17). The board shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of

Higher Education and Ministry and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.

6.1 Members shall be nominated by the bishop and elected by the Annual Conference for a term of four years and are eligible for re-election for one additional four-year term. The members shall be divided into two classes of four years each. The initial elected body shall be divided into two classes with one class serving for the remainder of the quadrennium and the other class shall be eligible for re-election for an additional four year tenure. Thereafter, each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for a four year term of office and shall be eligible for one additional quadrennium.

Council on Finance and Administration

7. There shall be a Conference Council on Finance and Administration which shall be composed of five ministers and six lay persons, nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. The Council shall have a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and a secretary who shall be nominated and elected by the members of the council. The Council shall have the responsibilities and duties assigned to it by the Book of Discipline (Para. 866) and such other responsibilities as may be delegated to it by the Annual Conference.

7.1 Members shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference for a term of four years and are eligible for re-election for one additional four-year term. The members shall be divided into two classes of four years each. The initial

elected body shall be divided into two classes, with one class serving for the remainder of the quadrennium and the other class shall be eligible for re-election for the additional four year tenure. Thereafter, each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for a four-year term of office and shall be eligible for one additional quadrennium.

United Methodist Women

The United Methodist Women shall be organized, function, and elect officers according to the Book of Discipline and by-laws adopted by the organization. It shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of Global Ministries and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.

Commission for Lay Concerns

The United Methodist Commission for Lay Concerns shall be organized, function, and elect officers according to the Book of Discipline and by-laws adopted by the organization. It shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of Discipleship and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.

Commission on Archives and History

from each district There shall be a Commission on Archives and History, consisting of one lay person and one clergy elected by the District Caucus, for a four year term. Four at-large members shall be added by nomination of the chairperson of the Commission and elected by the Annual Conference. The Commission shall have a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and secretary who shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. The Commission shall have the responsibilities and duties assigned to it by the Book of Discipline (Para. 1277) and other responsibilities as delegated to it by the Annual Conference. No member shall be eligible to serve for more than two consecutive terms.

The initial elected body shall be divided into two classes, with one class of the initial membership serving for two years and the other half receiving the full four years. Thereafter, one-half of the

members shall be elected annually for a full four-year term.

Commission on Religion and Race

There shall be a Commission on Religion and Race following the general guidelines and structure of the General Commission on Religion and Race as outlined in the Book of Discipline (Para. 1278

and 1279 as applicable).

The membership shall consist of the bishop, a district superintendent selected by the cabinet, the conference lay leader, the president of the United Methodist Women and twenty-six additional members. It is recommended that the twenty-six additional members be: four minority clergy; four minority lay men; four minority lay women; three youth under 18 (two minority and one white); three minority young adults, four white clergy; and four white lay persons. The additional members shall not be eligible to serve more than two consecutive years.

11.1.1 The initial elected body shall be divided into two classes with one class of the initial membership serving for two years and the other half receiving the full four years. Thereafter, every two years

one half the members shall be elected for a full four year term.

The Commission shall have the responsibilities and duties as outlined in the Book of Discipline (Para. 1280.3).

Commission on Status and Role of Women in the Church

The Commission on Status and Role of Women in the church shall be organized and function

according to the Book of Discipline.

The membership of the Commission shall consist of the following: three clergy, at least one of whom shall be a woman; three laymen; and three laywomen; two representatives from Conference United Methodist Women; and six members at-large, two of whom shall be under 18, one representative from each district, and all selected for their interest, expertise, and with concern for ethnic and age balance in representation.

Board of Trustees

There shall be a Conference Board of Trustees with duties and responsibilities as outlined in the

Book of Discipline (Para. 1410.12).

The membership shall consist of twelve persons who must be at least 30 years of age. Six shall be ministers in the effective relation in the conference and six shall be lay persons in good standing within local churches within the bounds of Central Texas Conference.

13.2 The Board shall be incorporated, unless the conference is incorporated in its own name; should the Board be incorporated, the above twelve persons shall be directors of the corporation. These persons shall be elected by the conference for a term of three years, except as to the first Board, one-third of whom shall be elected for a term of one year, one-third for a term of two years, and one-third for a term of three years, and shall serve until their successors have been elected and qualified; provided, however, that existing incorporated trustees of the Annual Conference may continue unaffected by this subsection unless and until such charter is amended.

Board of Diaconal Ministry

There shall be a Board of Diaconal Ministry which shall be elected, organized, and function according to the Book of Discipline (Para, 732).

Committee on Rules

There shall be a Conference Committee on Rules to develop and interpret the rules for governing 15. Annual Conference action and to propose new rules as needed for Annual Conference guides.

The membership shall be three lay men, three lay women, and three clergy, nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected quadrennially by the Annual Conference with a limit of one four year term.

There shall be a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and secretary who shall be nominated and elected by the membership of the Rules Committee. The first person named to this committee each quadrennium shall convene the committee for the purpose of organization.

Committee on Investigation

There shall be a Committee on Investigation to make inquiry into accusations against ministerial members of the Annual Conference and, where necessary, to make recommendations to the bishop for further action as per Para, 1540, the Book of Discipline.

The membership shall be five itinerant elders as permanent members and five itinerant elders as reserve members who shall be nominated by the bishop and elected annually by the Annual Conference

Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions

There shall be a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions to extend courtesy to all visitors to the Annual Conference sessions and to prepare appropriate resolutions to be read and adopted at the conference sessions. The committee shall be composed of two clergy and two lay persons nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected annually by the Annual Conference.

The Committee on Minutes

There shall be a Committee on Minutes to read and approve the Daily Proceedings of the Annual Conference. The members shall be two clergy and two lay persons who shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference.

Committee on Agenda

There shall be a Committee on Agenda to prepare the agenda of the Annual Conference and

submit it to the conference for adoption.

The membership shall be composed of the bishop, the assistant to the bishop, the district 19.1 superintendents, the conference lay leader, the president of the United Methodist Women, the Conference Secretary, the chairpersons of the conference boards, the chairperson of the conference Council on Ministries, two youth representatives from the Conference Youth Ministries, and the Conference Council director who shall be without vote.

19.2 The Committee shall nominate and elect its own officers.

The Committee shall present to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, prior to 19.3 the conference session, a detailed estimate of the expenses of the conference, including per diem allowance.

Annual Conference Committee on Nominations

There shall be an Annual Conference Committee on Nominations. It shall be the purpose of the committee to seek out and enlist the services of the best qualified persons available within the annual conference to fill various positions for which it is to make nominations.

The membership shall be the bishop, who shall be the chairperson, the district superintendents, 20.1 the conference lay leader, the conference presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, and the Conference Council on Youth Ministries; the District Lay Leaders; the District presidents of United Methodist Women, one other youth representative of the Conference Council on Youth Ministries, two minority representatives recommended by the Commission on Religion and Race, one of whom shall be a woman, and three clergy at large.

20.1.1 The nominating procedure shall be as follows:

a. Prior to February 1st of each year, the Conference Office shall make available to each district superintendent a listing of all offices for which nominations will be made at the ensuing Annual Conference session:

b. Prior to February 10th, the district superintendents of the respective districts shall distribute to the pastors of the respective districts the listing of all offices for which nominations will be made at the ensuing Annual Conference session for the purpose of soliciting suggestions from the local

church nominating committees relative to the Annual Conference offices in question;

c. Prior to March 15, the district representatives to the Conference Nominating Committee shall meet for the purpose of preparing district nominations for all offices in question, taking into consideration the names submitted by local church nominating committees. The representatives, however, shall make nominations of only persons they feel are adequately equipped for the task and may elect to not make nominations in these cases where they feel minimum qualifications for the offices in question are not present.

d. Prior to April 15, the district nominating group shall submit to the Conference Council Office the list of their nominations for the purpose of compilation and circulation to the members of the

Conference Nominating Committee at least ten days prior to its initial meeting.

e. Prior to May 10, the Conference Nominating Committee shall meet for the purpose of preparing a list of nominees for all officers which must be filled by the next Annual Conference session.

f. All persons being considered for an office in the Annual Conference shall be contacted before nomination to Annual Conference regarding the responsibilities of the office and whether or not they are willing to serve, if nominated and elected.

20.1.2 The Annual Conference Council on Ministries Director and the Conference Secretary shall be members without vote

The Committee shall nominate and elect a vice-chairperson and a secretary from within the 20.2 membership of the committee.

The Committee shall make such nominations to the Annual Conference as may be necessary for 20.3 the following positions: the chairperson, the vice-chairperson, secretary and the treasurer of the Conference Council on Ministries; the chairperson, the vice-chairperson, the secretary, and additional members of the Conference Board of Discipleship; the Conference Board of Church and Society; the Conference Board of Global Ministries; and the Conference Board of Higher Education and Ministry; the Conference Commission on Archives and History, the Conference Commission on Religion and Race, Commission on Status and Role of Women in the Church, the Conference Board of Trustees, the Conference Committee on Minutes, the Conference Board of Pensions, and the Conference Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions. It shall nominate such other persons as may be required or requested by the annual, jurisdictional or general conferences and related ecumenical bodies.

Insofar as possible, the membership on councils, boards, and agencies of the Annual Conference shall include one-third clergy, one-third lay women, and one-third laymen in keeping with the

policies for general church agencies, except for the Board of Ordained Ministry.

Commission on Equitable Salaries and Clergy Benefits

There shall be a Commission on Equitable Salaries which shall be organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (para. 934)

- The Commission shall be composed of ten members, five lay and five clergy persons, including at least one lay and one clergy from churches of fewer than two hundred members, all of whom shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.
- 21.3 The initial body shall be divided into two classes of three and one class of four persons with the first class of three serving for one year, the second class of three serving for two years and the class of four serving for three years. New members shall be elected for a three year term and shall be eligible for one additional three year term, except those members of the first two classes who shall only be eligible to serve one three year term after the expiration of their initial.

Temporary General Aid Committee

- 22.1 There shall be a Temporary General Aid Committee to administer the temporary general aid funds for grants-in-aid and for pensions and minimum salaries within the bounds of the Annual Conference.
- 22.2 The Committee shall be composed of:

1. The Executive Secretary of the Board of Pensions.

2. The Chairperson of the Commission on Equitable Salaries.

3. The Cabinet Representative to the Board of Higher Education & Ministry.

4. Two members at large, one of whom shall be an ethnic minority representative both of whom shall be nominated by the Annual Conference nominating committee, and elected by the Annual Conference for four year terms.

III. CONFERENCE ADMINISTRATION

Administrative Personnel:

Administrative Assistant to the Bishop

1. An ordained minister shall not serve more than six out of nine years in this position.

Administrative Personnel of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries

The tenure of office for a Clerical member of the Conference on the ACCOM staff shall be limited to eight years.

2.1 Any proposal to increase or change the structure of the executive staff of the Annual Conference shall be presented during a regular or called session of the Annual Conference, and shall not be voted on until the next session of the Annual Conference. No appointment predicated on the creation of such new or changed staff position shall be made, tentatively or finally, until the same is approved by the Annual Conference.

Conference Secretary-Treasurer

- The Conference Secretary-Treasurer shall be nominated by the Council on Finance and Administration, after consulting with the bishop and his cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference
- 3.1 The Conference Secretary-Treasurer shall be under the supervision of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration. He shall serve as the treasurer for the Board of Pensions, for the Commission on Equitable Salaries, and shall be co-ordinater for the Conference pension program.
- 3.2 The term of office of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be for a quadrennium and shall be limited to eight years. A newly elected Secretary-Treasurer shall ordinarily assume his official duties at the session of the Annual Conference following the General Conference.
- 3.3 All bonds required by the law of The United Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference shall be filed with the secretary of the conference. The bond for the Conference Secretary-Treasurer shall be approved by the bishop and his cabinet and filed in the bishop's office.
- 3.4 The Conference Secretary shall nominate to the Annual Conference such staff as needed to conduct the daily proceedings of the Annual Conference.

IV. FINANCIAL

- The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from January 1st to December 31st, and salaries
 of clerical members, appointed as pastors or district superintendents, shall be paid accordingly.
- 2. Remittances from a pastoral charge to the conference treasurer shall be accompanied by the remittance forms supplied by the Council on Finance and Administration. These forms shall be in triplicate and indicate clearly the amounts to be credited to each cause for which the remittance is made. The conference treasurer shall return one receipted form to the pastor and one to the district superintendent for each remittance. The pastor shall enclose the annual statement of receipts as issued by the conference treasurer, corrected if necessary, with the church's Annual Conference Report as verification of items reported in Table II.
- 3. After careful consideration of all financial responsibilities of the Annual Conference, the Council on Finance and Administration, with three liaison representatives selected by the Annual Conference Council on Ministries, meeting with the Council on Finance and Administration in all budget discussions, shall recommend an allocation for the major categories in the total conference financial program; ministerial support, conference claimants fund, administration, World Service, conference benevolences, and capital funding. The Annual Conference Council on

Ministries, being charged by the Discipline to study and coordinate the budget request of the several conference agencies as they relate to the conference program, shall formulate and present an itemized conference benevolence budget providing for the support of these agencies to the Council on Finance and Administration. If, for any reason, the Council on Finance and Administration decides that the total of the requests for the conference benevolence budget needs to be changed, it shall adjust the allocation and refer it back to the Annual Conference Council on Ministries for adjustments of the itemized appropriations in the conference benevolence budget.

3.1 If any program agency feels its cause has been neglected, jeopardized, or excluded, it shall have the opportunity to represent its cause before the Council on Finance and Administration as

provided in Para. 868 of The Book of Discipline.

3.2 Any proposal to create a new apportionment, or to change the purpose for an existing apportionment shall be presented during a regular or called session of the Annual Conference, and shall not be voted on until the next session of the Annual Conference.

4. All budget items allocated to the districts of the conference shall be based on the decimal arrived at by the following formula. Take total money raised, less the amount paid on principal and interest on indebtedness, less the amount paid for building and improvements and less the amount

paid for General and Conference Advance Specials.

5. It shall be the duty of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration to compute the decimal annually, using the latest statistics (corrected, if necessary) and furnish the table of apportionments to the districts. The district superintendent and the district stewards shall distribute the askings to the local church on the same basis.

 Items to be distributed under the formula are the Connectional Ministry Fund, Conference Claimants Fund, World Service and Conference Benevolences Fund, Conference Projects Fund, Ministerial Education Fund, Black Methodist College Fund, and the Ministers Insurance

Program Fund. Others may be added by the action of the Annual Conference.

7. The auditing firm appointed by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration shall audit all books of treasurers of boards whose auditing is not provided for in the Book of Discipline, and report the results to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, which Council will

send a statement of these audits to the conference secretary for inclusion in the minutes.

8. Annually, each board, or special interest, shall make request to the Council on Finance and Administration through the Annual Conference Council on Ministries for any special day offering, except where set by the Book of Discipline. No such day shall be recommended to the Annual Conference for any agency, cause, or institution, nor shall such a day be listed on the printed conference calendar, unless such agency, cause, or institution has presented a full financial statement and audit, including current annual income and expense, together with its report to the appropriate board.

For the quadrennium 1976-1980, all boards, commissions, committees and councils of the conference shall allow ten cents per mile, or fifteen cents per mile when two or more members

ride in the same car, for necessary travel to conference meetings.

10. The Conference Treasurer, after the close of the fiscal year, shall transfer from the accounts of all boards, commissions and other agencies of the Conference into the Operating Reserve all unexpended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just closed (excepting only items specifically exempt by C.F.A.) making allowances for all outstanding checks. This procedure is recommended with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer will honor the requisitions for all necessary expenses of the new fiscal year within the limits of the appropriations.

V. DISTRICTS

District Conference

 There shall be a District Conference in each district to the Annual Conference which shall meet at least two weeks prior to the Annual Conference after notice is given to all local churches by the district superintendent, who shall be the chairperson, and on call by the district superintendent

during the Annual Conference session.

- 1.1 The purpose of the District Conference shall be: (a) to elect district representatives to the Annual Conference Council on Ministries; (b) to elect district representatives to the conference agencies; (c) to elect members of the District Council on Ministries; (d) to elect two persons under age twenty-five to serve as members of the Annual Conference; and (e) such other business as it shall determine.
- 1.2 The membership of the District Conference shall be the lay and clerical delegates from that district to the Annual Conference and the lay pastors serving within the district, the district lay

leader, and the district president of the United Methodist Women, and all members of the Annual Conference residing within the district.

1.3 The District Conference records, where kept, are not to be reported to the Annual Conference.

District Committee on Nominations

 There shall be a District Committee on Nominations in each district of the Annual Conference for the purpose of nominating to the District Caucus the best qualified persons within the district for the various positions as required by the Annual Conference.

2.1 The membership shall be the district superintendent, who shall be the chairperson, and such other

persons as determined by the District Council on Ministries.

District Council on Ministries

3. There shall be a District Council on Ministries in each district of the Annual Conference. It shall be

liaison to the local church and the Annual Conference in all matters of program.

3.1 The District Council on Ministries shall be composed of the District Superintendent, the president of the district United Methodist Women, the district lay leader, a youth not over 18 years of age, the members of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries residing in the district, one laywoman, one layman, and one clerical representative to each conference board, one district representative of the Commission on Status and Role of Women, and such other persons as the District Council may determine. Interim vacancies may be filled by the District Council on Ministries in lieu of the District Conference.

3.2 The officers shall be a chairperson and such other officers as the council shall determine who shall

be elected by the Council upon nomination of the District Committee on Nomination.

VI. LOCAL CHURCHES

 Each congregation shall annually give attention to its vacation policy, using as the guideline for its discussion the statement contained in the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee Manual as issued by the General Church.

2. In the event of death of a minister residing in a parsonage, the family of the deceased minister will

be allowed thirty days to find other housing and vacate the parsonage.

VII. DISCONTINUED OR ABANDONED CHURCHES

1. When a local church has been discontinued or abandoned and the property disposed of as directed by the Book of Discipline in accordance with Paragraph 2441, the proceeds derived therefrom, if any, shall be first applied to the retirement of pension deficits, and the satisfaction of any claims against ministerial pension annuities which may have arisen out of failure of that church to make proportionate payment for ministerial support. The Trustees of the Conference shall recommend to the next session of the Annual Conference the disposition of any remaining proceeds.

EQUITABLE SALARY SUPPORT

Plan of Operation

There shall be a program of minimum pastoral support in the Central Texas Conference, under the management of The Board of Higher Education and Ministry and the Committee on Equitable Salary.

Duties and Responsibilities

The duties and responsibilities of the Commission shall be to have charge of and promote all of the interests of the Equitable Salary Support Program.

Administrative Procedure

 The following conditions shall be met by a pastoral charge to become eligible for consideration by the Commission for a pastor to receive salary supplements from the Fund:

(a) The pastoral charge shall have conducted an Every Member Canvass for the local church

budget of each of its churches during the previous conference year.

(b) The apportionment for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall have been accepted and paid in full for the previous conference year. (c) The charge must pay a minimum of \$1,800 for pastor's salary and must have at least 100 members.

Persons of the following ministerial relationships (listed below) are eligible for consideration for salary supplements at the level indicated:

(a) Elder, Full Connection	ı
(b) Associate Member	ĺ
(c) Full Time Local Pastor	ì
(d) Probationary Member	
1. Non-Student Living on Charge	
2. Non-Student Living Away From Charge	
3. Student Living on Charge	
4. Student Living away from Charge	
(e) Student Local Pastors

2 Living Away from Charge	

Where the local church's pastor's salary is below the Conference minimum the Conference will pay 110% of the supplement paid for 1978 (provided the 110% does not raise the salary above the new minimum). Beyond that the Conference will add one dollar of supplement for each one dollar the local church increases the local pastor's salary up to the minimum salary set by the Conference.

4. In addition to the above schedule and above limitation of aid, seminary students who are serving pastoral charges and receiving Equitable Salary Supplements, may receive \$1.00 per mile, one way, one time per year, for the distance from the seminary to the pastoral charge. This extra allowance shall be computed by the Commission, and paid in one payment to the seminary student pastor serving the charge at the end of the third quarter of the Conference year.

5. Those ministers who are not eligible for salary supplement are:

(a) Those whose appointment is other than pastor of a charge within the Central Texas Conference.

(b) Those who receive salary aid from the General Conference Board of Missions.

(c) Those classified as part-time local pastors.

(d) Retired ministers who receive income from any other employment other than the regular work of the pastoral ministry.

(e) No pastor shall be eligible to receive salary supplements from this Fund who has been offered appointments with higher salary, but who persistently prefers for personal reasons to remain in his present appointment.

(f) The District Superintendent shall combine the salary, travel expense, and utility expense

allowed as total salary when making a supplement request.

- 6. A prerequisite for consideration for salary supplements from this Fund shall be filing with the Commission a written application by the District Superintendent. This application shall indicate the classification of the pastor, the salary set by the charge, the amount of increase in pastor's salary to be matched by Salary Support, and shall contain the certifications by the District Superintendent whether or not the pastoral charge has met each of the requirements set forth above in Section 1, 2 and 3.
- 7. In cases of appointments, or changes of appointments, between the sessions of the Annual Conference, all above requirements are applicable and the District Superintendent shall file a new application for each charge concerned. Such salary supplements, if approved, shall be paid on a pro rata basis for the part of the year actually served.

8. The District Superintendents shall be responsible for making the program effective in their respective districts, as in all other causes of the Church, and for the collection of the amounts apportioned to the churches in their respective districts and for the rearrangement of pastoral charges, as necessary, to provide that the salary for the pastor to be paid by the charges be not less

than \$1,800.00 per year.

9. Payments on the apportionment of the Churches shall be made at least quarterly to the Treasurer of the Annual Conference. The Commission shall make payments to those receiving the benefits of the Fund at the end of the first three quarters of the Conference year, namely, September 1, December 1, March 1, and payments for the fourth quarter of the year ending May 31st, shall be made on May 15th. All of these quarterly payments shall be made on the same percentage basis as that of which the funds shall come to the hands of the Conference Treasurer, without discrimination in any case, and if receipts of funds by the Conference Treasurer prior to the session of the Annual Conference are not sufficient to meet all commitments, the final settlement for the year shall be made after all remittances have been made to the Conference Treasurer. 10. A complete financial statement shall be made at each session of the Annual Conference, showing all receipts from the Conference Treasurer during the year, all payments of those receiving the benefits of the Fund, and for all other purposes. This exhibit of receipts and disbursements shall be published each year in the Conference Journal.

Expenses for work of the Commission, such as stationery, stamps, office supplies, necessary clerical work, etc., shall be allowed from the Fund, and the traveling expenses of the members of the Commission, together with the cost of meals enroute, to all meetings of the Commission except such as are held while the Annual Conference is in session shall be allowed. Traveling expenses shall be paid in

accordance with the Standing Rules of the Annual Conference.

Three-fourths of the amount normally payable to those receiving the benefits of the Fund shall be allowed until the meeting of the Commission prior to the session of the Annual Conference, at which time if a sufficient amount of money has been realized from the apportionment, payments for the fourth quarter shall be made not later than May 15th of each year.

Emergency aid shall be limited to those whose total income does not exceed the minimum salary for their classification, and the amount granted shall not exceed ten (10) per cent of their classification.

Committee On Sustentation

Report No. 1

OPERATIONAL PROCEDURE FOR SUSTENTATION Plan of Operation

 There shall be a program of sustentation in the Central Texas Conference under the direction and management of the Executive Committee of the Board of Pensions. This committee will have charge of and promote all the interests of the Sustentation program and shall be the determining factor in the final approval of any candidate for participation in this

2. We recommend that the amount of sustentation granted to an applicant shall be the amount of the

current minimum salary.

3. We recommend further that the following shall be eligible for participation:

1. All ministers of the Central Texas Conference who have been admitted on trial, or have been received into full connection, provided they have not reached the age of voluntary retirement, which is sixty-five (65) years of age.

2. An approved supply pastor who shall have rendered not less than ten (10) years of full-time

approved service as pastor of a charge in the Central Texas Conference.

3. Any Minister, meeting the above requirements, who is relieved of his pastoral duties and granted a leave of absence from his charge by the Bishop and Cabinet any Conference year for physical or pyschological reasons shall be eligible for sustentation for the portion of the year that remains until the next meeting of the Annual Conference.

4. We recommend the following procedure:

1. The applicant shall make his desire known, in writing, to the Committee on Sustentation.

2. The applicant must submit to a complete examination of the Clinic of The Harris Hospital in Fort Worth, Texas and the Certificate of Disability must be completed by the examining physician. Emphasis shall be placed upon question number eight (8) of the Certificate of Disability which asks: "Do you unreservedly feel that one year leave of absence would be conducive to restoration of health so that the claimant might continue in an effective ministry?"

3. In extreme emergencies, the Committee will consider the diagnosis and recommendations of a

duly qualified physician, but not the claimant's personal physician.

4. When the applicant is approved by the Committee, the name of the applicant shall be submitted to the Committee on Conference Relations with a request that a leave of absence be granted for a period of one year. With the approval of the Committee on Conference Relations and the favorable action of the Annual Conference, the applicant shall be eligible for the benefits of this

5. We unreservedly recommend that no person be eligible for sustentation funds for a period

exceeding twelve (12) months running consecutively. 6. All payments shall be made to the claimant monthly.

5. We recommend the following financial plan:

1. The Committee shall be given authority to draw upon the Operating Reserve Fund of the Central Texas Conference such amounts as are necessary during any given Conference Year to meet the needs of the applicants in accordance with the above suggested practice.

2. After the amount expended during a Conference Year has been determined, the Committee on Sustentation will make a request to the Council on Finance and Administration for the inclusion of that amount in the Conference Budget for the ensuing year. This procedure will be most practical for there is no way to actually determine the full amount which will be needed in any Conference Year, and if the plan is followed, there will be no possibility of having surplus or deficiencies in the money available for the Sustentation Committee.

CENTRAL TEXAS CONFERENCE ORGANIZATON OF COMMISSION FOR LAY CONCERNS

There shall be a Central Texas Conference Commission for Lay Concerns. It shall cooperate with and facilitate the activities of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries.

PURPOSE: The conference Commission for Lay Concerns shall establish and maintain communication with the district laity organizations and the district Council on Ministries for the purpose of helping make them aware of resources available from General, Jurisdictional and Annual Conference as well as programs of other districts in the Central Texas Conference. The Commission for Lay Concerns shall also be in close cooperation with the Annual Conference Council on Ministries and

Board of Discipleship to aid in developing and implementing programs to and for the laity.

OFFICERS: The conference lay leader shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference upon nomination by the Commission for Lay Concerns. The nomination shall be by written ballot. The two associate conference lay leaders, one of whom shall be vice chairperson of the Commission for Lay Concerns, four sub-conference lay leaders, conference director of lay speaking, conference director of United Methodist Men, the recording secretary, the treasurer and such other officers as the conference Commission for Lay Concerns may authorize shall be elected annually upon nomination by the nominating committee.

MEMBERSHIP: The conference Commission for Lay Concerns shall be composed of the conference lay leader, who shall be chairperson, two associate conference lay leaders, four sub-conference lay leaders, the conference directors of lay speaking and United Methodist Men, the district lay leaders, the presiding (or his representative) bishop, the district superintendents, the conference president of United Methodist Women, two (2) conference youth representatives selected by the United Methodist Youth, the recording secretary, the treasurer and such other officers as the conference Commission for Lay Concerns shall authorize. Members shall include the assistant to the bishop and the Conference Council director.

TENURE AND VACANCIES: Election of Commission for Lay Concerns members shall be for one (1) year. No person shall serve more than eight (8) consecutive years in the same elected office. Vacancies

shall be filled by the Commission for Lay Concerns as they occur.

STANDING COMMITTEES: There shall be an executive committee of the conference Commission for Lay Concerns consisting of the conference lay leader, who shall be chairperson, two (2) associate conference lay leaders, the conference president of United Methodist Women or her representative, conference directors of lay speaking and United Methodist Men, a cabinet representative, the elected officers and such others as the Commission for Lay Concerns may authorize. There shall be a nominating committee appointed by the conference lay leader consisting of not less than four (4) nor more than eight (8) members of the Commission for Lay Concerns plus the cabinet representative.

MEETINGS: The Commission for Lay Concerns and/or its executive committee shall meet annually or as often as necessary to carry on its work and shall be called into session by the conference lay leader

or presiding bishop.

FINANCES: The Commission for Lay Concerns shall cooperate with the Annual Conference Council on Ministries in obtaining funds for its needs in fulfilling its duties. The executive committee shall act as

the budget committee.

CONFERENCE LAY LEADER: (Paragraph 1051 Discipline) — The conference lay leader is the designated leader of the conference laity, with responsibility for becoming increasingly aware of the work of the laity in achieving the mission of the Church. The conference lay leader shall guide the deliberations of the Commission for Lay Concerns in developing long-range and annual objectives, direct the implementation of these objectives and represent the Commission for Lay Concerns in other conference agencies as determined by the Discipline. The conference lay leader shall guide the work of the Commission for Lay Concerns so that it will be coordinated with the comprehensive program of the conference. The conference lay leader shall present a written report annually to the Commission for Lay Concerns and the Annual Conference. The conference lay leader shall be seated in the Annual Conference as a voting member.

ASSOCIATE CONFERENCE LAY LEADER AND SUB-CONFERENCE LAY LEADERS: There shall be two (2) associate conference lay leaders whose work shall be related to the conference lay leader and who shall each be responsible for the esablishment and maintenance of communication with one or more sub-conference lay leaders as assigned for the purpose of making them aware of resources and programs in all levels of the church and receiving from them programs that are in progress in their district. There shall be four (4) sub-conference lay leaders who shall each be responsible for the establishment and maintenance of communications with one (1) or more district lay leaders and district Councils on Ministries as assigned for the purpose of making them aware of resources and programs in all areas of lay concerns available at all levels of the church and receiving from them programs in progress in their local church as well as district wide programs.

CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF LAY SPEAKING: The conference director of lay speaking shall work to become informed in the area of oral communications for the purpose of aiding district directors in establishing programs aimed at increasing the effectiveness of the witness of laity. These programs shall involve both speaking to groups and in one-to-one relationships. The director shall be guided by

standards set in the Discipline (1972) paragraphs 1067-1070.

CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF UNITED METHODIST MEN: The conference director of United Methodist Men shall be involved in an ongoing program of research to find ministries to/and for men in the church and community. He shall be knowledgeable of the options and resources available to the local church and make these known to the district directors in order that they might make them known to the local churches. At the same time, he shall seek information from the district directors of options and ministries available in their districts.

THE DISTRICT ORGANIZATION OF COMMISSION FOR LAY CONCERNS

There shall be in every district an organization of the laity known as the District Commission for Lay Concerns.

OBJECTIVE AND PURPOSE: The purpose of the district Commission for Lay Concerns shall be to establish and maintain communication between the Annual Conference and district Councils on Ministries and the local church. Additionally, it shall make the laity of the local church aware of their role in the total program of the church, and help them assume a proper role in carrying out this program.

MEMBERSHIP: The district Commission for Lay Concerns shall be composed of the district lay leader who shall be chairperson, the sub-district lay leaders, the district directors of lay speaking and United Methodist Men, local church lay leaders, the district superintendent, the district president of United Methodist Women, two (2) youth representatives and such others as authorized by the district

Commission for Lay Concerns.

OFFICERS: The district lay leader shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference upon nomination by the district Commission for Lay Concerns. A secretary and a treasurer, sub-district lay leaders (there shall be one (1) sub-district lay leader for each five (5) or six (6) churches in the district), district director of lay speaking, district director of United Methodist Men and other directors as authorized by the district Commission for Lay Concerns shall be elected annually by the district Commission for Lay Concerns.

TENURE AND VACANCIES: All elections of Commission for Lay Concerns members shall be for the term of one (1) year. Any vacancy occurring in the district Commission for Lay Concerns shall be filled

by that Commission for Lay Concerns.

STANDING COMMITTEES: There shall be an executive committee of the district Commission for Lay Concerns consisting of the district lay leader, who shall be chairperson, a sub-district lay leader representative (elected annually by the district Commission for Lay Concerns), district directors of lay speaking and United Methodist Men, the district president of United Methodist Women, the district superintendent and the elected officers and such others as the district Commission for Lay Concerns shall authorize. There may be a nominations committee consisting of the district lay leader who shall be chairperson, the district superintendent and as many as five (5) but not less than one (1) other Commission for Lay Concerns members.

MEETINGS: The Commission for Lay Concerns and/or its executive committee shall meet annually or as often as necessary to carry out its duties. Meetings shall be called by the district lay leader or

district superintendent.

FINANCES: The district Commission for Lay Concerns through its executive committee shall cooperate with the conference Commission for Lay Concerns to obtain funds needed to carry out its duties.

THE DISTRICT LAY LEADERS AND SUB-DISTRICT LAY LEADERS: The work of the district lay leader is to be responsible for becoming increasingly aware of the role of the laity in carrying out the mission of the church. The district lay leader shall work in close cooperation with the district superintendent in seeking to carry out that mission. The work of the sub-district lay leader shall be to become increasingly aware of the role of the laity in carrying out the mission of the church and interpreting this awareness to the laity of the sub-district that they may be about this mission. The sub-district lay leader shall visit each of the churches in the sub-district a minimum of four (4) times per year (one (1) visit to be a charge conference).

DISTRICT DIRECTOR OF LAY SPEAKING: The district director of lay speaking shall work to become informed in the area of oral communications and use this knowledge in instituting programs within the district for the purpose of increasing the effectiveness of the witness of the laity. This shall

involve the training for speaking to groups and in one-to-one relationships.

DISTRICT DIRECTOR OF UNITED METHODIST MEN: The district director of United Methodist Men shall be the source of information for the churches of the district in the work of the United Methodist Men. He shall make himself aware of the opportunities for ministry of/and to men in the local church and community. It shall be his responsibility to make these options known to the local churches in order that they may take advantage of these opportunities for ministry.

This document may be changed by a simple majority of those present and voting at the regular annual meeting of the conference Commission for Lay Concerns provided that ten (10) days notice of the

proposed change be given in writing to its membership in advance of said meeting.

We have examined the Summary of Cash Receipts and Disbursements of Dr. J. W. Sprinkle, Secretary-Treasurer, Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church, for the year ended December 31, 1979. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1, the Central Texas Conference's policy is to prepare this summary on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenue is recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statement is not intended to present results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, since such accounting principles require the accrual of income and expenses.

The Supplementary Information included in this report is presented for information only, since the status of these items are of interest to the readers of this report in conjunction with the various funds to which they are related. However, the scope of our examination was limited to a review on auditing procedures with regard to the Supplementary Information except to confirm the balances shown.

In our opinion, the accompanying Summary of Cash Receipts and Disbursements referred to above present fairly the recorded cash receipts and disbursements of the Conference Treasurer for the year then ended, on the basis described in Note 1, which basis has been applied in a manner consistent with that of the preceding year.
